Cherry Men to Meet— A meeting of cherry growers of the district has been called for Tuesday night by C. A. Clark, president of the Willamette Valley Cherry Growers' association. The meeting will result in a discussion of the brown rot and plans will be made to combat the menace to the fruit. The heavy rain late in the week did little damage to the fruit, it is believed, but the wet weather is very favorable to brown rot conditions. The situation is believed to be very serious in the district, or at least will be so unless immediate action is taken by the growers.
