PULMOTOR NOT CERTAIN

PEOPLE HELD TOO DEPENDENT UPON INSTRUMENT

"People depend too much upon the pulmomotor in cases of emergency, instead of resorting to immediate resuscitation methods and as a result many persons needlessly lose their lives," declares William Hamilton, manager of the Salem office of the Portland Electric Power company.

"Instead of getting busy and endeavoring to put the person on the road to recovery, they wait for the arrival of the instrument before attempts are made to save the unfortunate individual. Our company found that too many deaths resulted in accidents, which otherwise might not have occurred, if proper and immediate steps had been taken to give relief. The Portland Electric company had several of the pulmomotors distributed about their districts but they were not to the best advantage.

"Many experiments have proved that this method is the better," continued the speaker as he called attention to an illustrated chart, depicting methods to be used in resuscitation.

ZANNI FORCED TO QUIT

TOKIO, June 3.—(By Associated Press)—The round the world flight of Major Pedro Zanni, the Argentine aviator, interrupted here last year, has been definitely abandoned owing to the fact that his airplane, damaged when he attempted to take off at Osaka on May 14, cannot be repaired. The upper wing was damaged beyond repair. The supply ships sent here from Vancouver, B. C., are being ordered back.

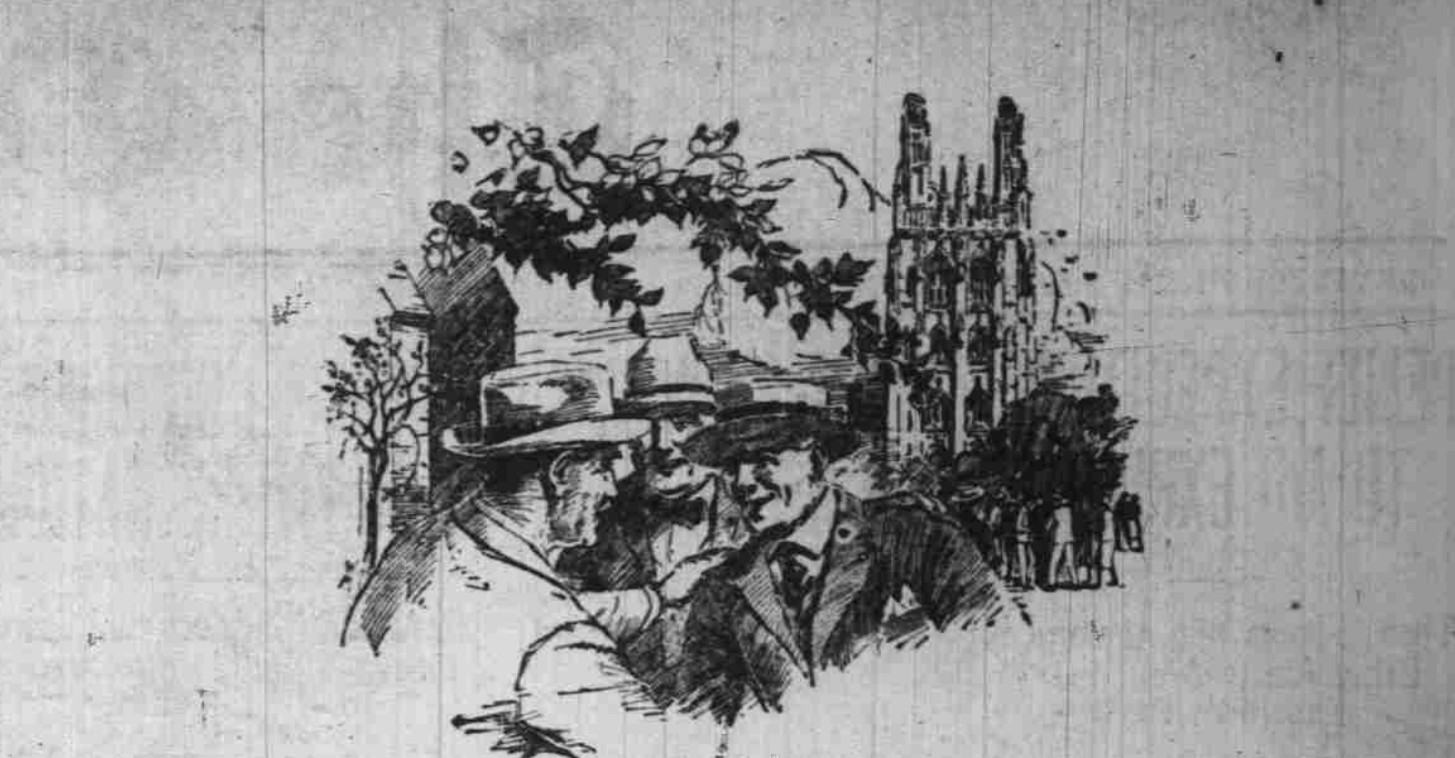
