ELEVEN ENTRIES ARE READY FOR AUTO RACE

COMPLETE PROTECTION IS PROMISED SPECTATORS

Contests Under Direction of AAA; Six Big Racing Events Are Listed for Saturday

Eleven professional automobile drivers will participate in AAA races at the fair grounds, beginning at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. An invitation has been extended to Governor Pierce, Secretary of State Keizer, State Treasurer Kay and other state officials. Mayor Giesy has received definite promise of adequate patrolling of the course to eliminate any accidents. The contract provides that if the management fails to protect the spectators the race may be stopped by the police.

The track is in excellent condition for the races and some fast time is anticipated. While contracts have been signed by owners of eleven racing cars, a fourth, a Cleveland Special, is expected to compete. Three main events are scheduled, while others may be offered if the attendance warrants. In addition, several motorcycle events have been arranged, with Cody Evans of Salem one of the principal riders.

FISHING IS GOOD OVER WEEK-END

Where to Go and How to Get There is Told by George E. Cadwell of Anderson's Sporting Goods Store.

Despite the unfavorable weather the past week a few good reports from local streams have come in. Coast streams are reported to be in fine condition for fishing, despite the recent rains and the outlook for the week-end is very favorable. Reports from Pacific City and Tillamook state that the Salmon fishing has been fairly good the past week, some boats getting as high as four and five Salmon.

Big Nestucca River—A nice bunch of fish totaling 85 in number were caught Wednesday of this week above Beaver by a party of four fishermen, who report that the water is low and in fine condition for fishing. Spinner and chub being the best bait. The fishing is best on this stream the later part of the afternoon. Royal Coachman, Professor and Governor being the best flies. Take west side highway to Beaver, via Rickereall and Amity.

Thomas Creek—Reports of this stream are very favorable, water is clear and there seems to be plenty of fish. Best fishing is said to be from about eight miles above Scio to Jordan. Spinners and chub are the best bait, with Royal Coachman, McInty and Blue Upright flies being good also. Take Jefferson highway to Jefferson, turn on Scio road past Scio.

Dallas Mill Creek—Via Dallas to Buell. This should be at its best during the first part of June and providing the weather clears up the prospects look very good for Sunday fishing. Spinners and chub, Red and Blue Upright, Brown Hackle and McInty flies being the best lures. Salmon eggs also can be used with good success.

TOMMY GIBBONS TO USE NEW TACTICS IN MATCH

WILL EMPLOY AGGRESSIVE SYSTEM IN TODAY'S FIGHT

Jack Dempsey, Champion, "May Meet" Winner, Cablegram Announces

NEW YORK, June 4.—(By The Associated Press)—Tom Gibbons of St. Paul, master defensive boxer, today said he had planned an aggressive battle to defeat Gene Tunney in their 15 round, fight tomorrow night at the Polo grounds.

"I'm going to be on the offen-

sive from the first bell," he said. "I'll make a fight out of it, and the faster Gene comes at me the better I'll like it."
Tunney, who arrived in New York today from his Saratoga Lake training camp, appeared in excellent condition. The retired lightweight champion, Benny Leonard, will be his second.
Confidence pervaded the ranks of the Tunney followers although Gene himself had no predictions to make.
Added importance was given the fight today with the receipt of a cablegram from Jack Dempsey to Billy Gibson, manager of Tunney, stating the champion would "positively meet" the winner of the fight if the proper inducements are offered.
