Plan to Make Tiber River Navigable
ROME, June 11.—Much discussion has been revived concerning the making of the Tiber river navigable from the Mediterranean as far as Rome, at least for freight barges and small tugs. Proponents of the plan argue that the growing population of the capital is beginning to tax the railroad beyond their capacity to bring food and other supplies. If grain and heavy materials could be brought from the sea by water it would relieve the railroads of a tremendous burden, and might even make prices slightly cheaper.

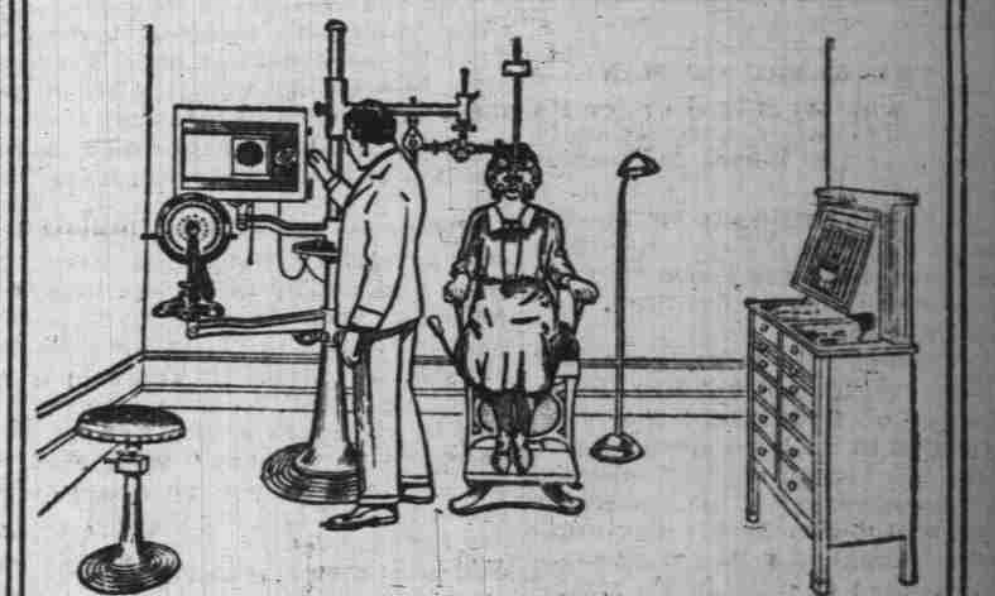
