ONE of the most beautiful wedding ceremonies ever solemnized in the Willamette Valley took place at 8:30 o'clock on Tuesday evening, June 16, in McMinnville, when Miss Mildred Apperson and Mr. Charles Glasgow Robertson were united in marriage at the home of the bride's parents, at 209 North C street. In the presence of a large number of friends, Reverend Bruce Giffin, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Eugene conducted the impressive service, the single ring ceremony being used.

The drawing room of the spacious Apperson home was transformed into a veritable June garden, walled and tapestried with flowers in the delicate pastel hues. The fire-place, and the entire wall, from floor to ceiling, was completely banked with garden beauty roses, azure delphinium, pink snapdragons and carnations, sprays of fern, and Oriental poppies in delicate shades. In the sun-parlor and in the reception hall at the foot of the stairway baskets of the same blossoms were used. The archways throughout were embowered with sprays of silver birch. The bride's pathway was symbolically marked with white satin streamers leading from the stairway to the doors of the drawing room.

Mrs. R. F. Gray of Portland, a cousin of the bride, played Mendelssohn's "Wedding March," immediately after which Mr. Gray, with Mrs. Gray accompanying, sang "At Dawning" and "Until."

The bride, lovely in her gown of white satin, approached the altar on the arm of her father who gave her in marriage. On the prayer bench, covered with an exquisite Oriental rug, the bridal couple knelt. Miss Margaret Griffith, a sorority sister of the bride, was maid-of-honor, while Mr. L. K. Fraley of Portland, a fraternity brother of the groom, was best man. The bride wore white satin adorned with silver and pearl beads, and the full-length wedding veil which was worn by the groom's mother, Mrs. Charles H. Robertson, at her wedding. The bride's slippers were in silver. A head-dress of Duchess lace with gardenias, completed a costume that was ravishing in its beauty. Miss Apperson's only ornament was a strand of pearls, the gift of the groom. Her shower bouquet was of orchid, sweet peas, and bride's roses, with Cecil Brunner rosebuds caught in the satin streamers.

Miss Griffith was lovely in coral chiffon adorned with an ornamental surface beading of pearls and brilliants. She carried an arm bouquet of pink and lavender sweet peas, with Cecil Brunner roses and maiden hair fern.

The bride's mother, Mrs. Edwin C. Apperson, wore a particularly attractive mode of Rosewood chiffon with hand-embroidered cut-work, while the mother of the groom, Mrs. Charles H. Robertson, was charming in a gown of black satin with a deep inserted border of brocade cloth-of-gold and a very narrow border of old gold and old rose in a rich floral design.

A reception took place immediately following the ceremony. The dining room was decorated in the same pastel shades as were used at the altar. From the chandelier over the reception table streamers in white satin were arranged from which blossoms in the chosen colors were suspended in a shower. A French bouquet of flowers centered the table on which four pink tapers burned in silver holders. Mrs. Homer Goulet and Mrs. Jesse Harrington presided at the urns.

Mrs. Walter Hembrie, of McMinnville, Miss Alice Link of McMinnville, Mrs. David Nayburger of McMinnville, and Miss Gretchen Brown and Miss Mary Jane Albert of Salem.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Robertson are former students of the University of Oregon, their romance culminating through their college days. Mrs. Robertson is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin C. Apperson of McMinnville where Mr. Apperson is president of the McMinnville National Bank, while Mr. Robertson is the only son of Dr. and Mrs. Charles H. Robertson; prominent among the families of Salem where Dr. Robertson is a leading physician. Mrs. Robertson is a member of the Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority while the groom belongs not only to the Sigma Nu fraternity but also to the Nu Sigma Nu medical fraternity.

After a two week's motor trip to British Columbia, Mr. and Mrs.

Robertson will be at home in Portland. The bride's going-away costume was a distinctively lovely ensemble in black satin with a blouse of yellow georgette worn with hat and accessories to harmonize.
