**SALEM GARDEN CLUB ORGANIZATION'S NEW TITLE**

Announcement is made of an intended change in the name of the Salem Floral society to the Salem Garden club in the early fall. This is done because "garden club" is more inclusive of the purposes of the society, its garden and civic intentions, than "floral society," and because it desires finally to affiliate with the Garden Club of America, a prominent and influential organization with headquarters at Philadelphia.

A drive will then be put on to increase the membership of the club to 2000 or more, which will insure its strength, permanence and influence.

The Seattle Garden Club has planted during the past two years 40 miles of trees out-lining the Memorial highway.

Another coast city has a magnificent scheme already accomplished.

Among the achievements of the national organization is a botanical garden in the Panama zone, with another well under way at Washington, D. C.

Its object as stated by itself is "to stimulate the knowledge and love of gardens; to share the advantage of association and conference in this country and abroad, to encourage civic planting, and to aid in the protection of native plants and trees." The names of some of its leading committees: Achievement, Roadside, Flower Show, Visiting Gardens, Billboard and Wildflower, will suggest the scope of its activities.

It is in this stimulating and universal company that the Salem Floral society aspires to be. And announcement is made now that many may join the Salem Floral society at its forth-coming show, and thus become prospective pioneers in the formation of the new Garden club.
