WHAT IS SUCCESS; AND WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT YOUR PITUITARY BODY?

What do you know about your pituitary body? Would you give \$20,000 or more to know all that by patient research may be known about it?

It is likely that you did not know you had one. The writer did not, till a few days ago. Here are the opening words of a chapter on the pituitary body in the book of Benjamin Harrow on "Glands in Health and Disease."

"It seems hardly credible that a piece of tissue weighing one-sixtieth of an ounce, the size of a hazel-nut, and lying at the base of the skull, should, perhaps, be involved in the production of giants on the one hand, and dwarfs on the other; that it, like the thyroid gland, should profoundly influence metabolic and brain functions, growth and life itself; yet such seems to be the case with the pituitary gland."

The medical profession ought to know all about a gland having such a large place in the destiny of the human race; (and it has a book full of functions not mentioned by Dr. Harrow in the paragraph quoted.) He mentions them in other paragraphs—

But ancient medical men only knew there was such a gland, and did not suspect its importance, and, up to this very day, the great majority of the doctors of the world have only just begun to know the importance of keeping the pituitary body on its job, and they have just begun to know how to do it—and they have a lot to learn yet. Any reputable physician will tell you that.

A pituitary body with the wrong slant at the base of the brain of a child may make him or her a runt, a dwarf, or may make the child a giant; an ungainly person with bones abnormally long. This thing has been going on for countless generations, and nothing had been done about it till a short time ago, and little enough has been done about it yet.

On the last visit of Dr. C. H. Robertson of Salem to the institutions of the Mayo Brothers at Rochester, Minn., he found a relative of his, H. E. Robertson, at work on the pituitary body—and he had then been at work for over two years, under salary from the Mayos—

And he was still going. He had been professor of anatomy at the state medical school of Minnesota when the Mayos secured his services, as the best man they could find to do research work on the pituitary body, or gland—

And the Mayos had already spent a good deal more than \$20,000 on this one piece of research work alone. Why should they? Their great practice does not depend on a better knowledge of this gland. But no one else was doing it. And the same was true as to a long list of subjects. At the time Dr. Robertson of Salem was there last, the Mayo staff consisted of 95 men and women of outstanding industry or ability or both in their various lines—

And half of all the work being done was research work. It was work for the good of humanity in general.

That is what these men are doing for the world. They were farm boys. A part of the city of Rochester has been built up around them on the farm that was their father's. The whole wide world has come to them for treatment and for study. They are spending their surplus income upon research work, in order to give to humanity a better understanding of the human body, "fearfully and wonderfully made," and much more so than most of us even faintly realize. They are marking the medical and surgical trails a little more plainly. They are doing work that is being done by good surgeons and physicians all over the world; that is being done in Salem. But they are able to perform major tasks. They are endowed and circumstanced as five talent men. Because the two Mayos have lived and labored there will be less suffering in the world. Diseases will be better understood and their cure more certainly effected—throughout all the reaches of civilization and touching even the dark corners of the earth.

For the Mayo Brothers, that is success. Not in dollars piled up, but in a record of service done.

The pituitary body is only one illustration. There are many others, under the activities of these remarkable men; as plain and simple in their living and thinking as they were as farm boys in their youth; but matching minds with the greatest men of the age in their profession, and in all high callings.

You have known in your locality a "Pug" Jones or a "Shrimp" Smith, or a "Long" Simpson, or a man or woman malformed in some other way. A full knowledge of how to keep the pituitary body functioning in normal fashion will in good time make normal men and women of all such.

That is costing the Mayo Brothers a pretty sum of money; but its value to the world will be beyond estimate.

Success in life is doing your work in your particular corner, to the full extent of your strength and ability; and doing it in the spirit of service to your fellow men.

"FATHER'S DAY"

Today is "Father's Day." It will be observed with becoming modesty. Neither the nation's Chief Executive nor the Governors of the commonwealths have issued "soulful" proclamations setting forth the merits of the event. Even "Ma" Ferguson has let it pass without veto.

Surely Father isn't such a nonentity in home, state and country that the attempt to emulate Mother's Day as a compliment to him should be thus lightly treated? "What is home without a mother" adorns many a parlor wall. "What is homier than a home with both mother and father" should supplement this motto.

Surely father is an important factor in the scheme of household plans and economies. It devolves upon him primarily to furnish shelter, food and clothing. It is his duty to bear a fifty-fifty portion at least of the responsibility for the mental, moral and spiritual education of the children. On the same comparative basis he must perform the duties of citizenship toward government including civic and social welfare of the community and state. And he bears a tremendous responsibility of setting a proper example for young and old in matters of recreation and general personal conduct.

Father suffers discouragements and worries second only to those usually accredited to mother in the economic conduct of the home. His coat may be threadbare but the daughter's wardrobe must be restocked. The dentist, the grocer, and even the radio-maker must be paid. College bills and "expense" money must be furnished and father wears the old coat longer. The attractiveness and education of the family is his first pride and consolation. To him the hues of life are often somber when he strives to see his way through the maze of obligations.

But Father's Day with only modest acclaim may serve a real purpose. It is a special event when the wife may remind him especially of her continued appreciation of his work and sacrifices for her and the children's welfare; the boys may tell him that he is the best of all men they have known; and the girls, also, may impress their love upon him.

These experiences should stimulate his heart to increased devotion and new endeavor. May all the future days reflect a little of this "Father's Day" experience.
