TRIBESMEN PUSH FRENCH FIGHTING ON MOROCCAN BORDER DECLARED SEVERE

ELARAISH, Spanish Morocco, June 30.—(By Associated Press.)—Advises from the French battle front in Morocco are to the effect that communication between the French positions of Tizga and Ain Aloha is interrupted. The tribesmen are said to be pressing very strongly against these sectors.

FEZ, French Morocco, June 30.—Intelligence received from all sources show that the Moors are developing an offensive in force against the French in the eastern and center sections. The official communique announcing this says "The enemy's pressure in the east is increasing in the direction of Mails, and there have been clashes with the French forces occupying the heights north of that point. The enemy is also concentrating at Ain Zohra and Mesquiten while large numbers of the Rifians are filtering through the lines in Dahar Gemoh, but are being held in check by friendly tribesmen."
