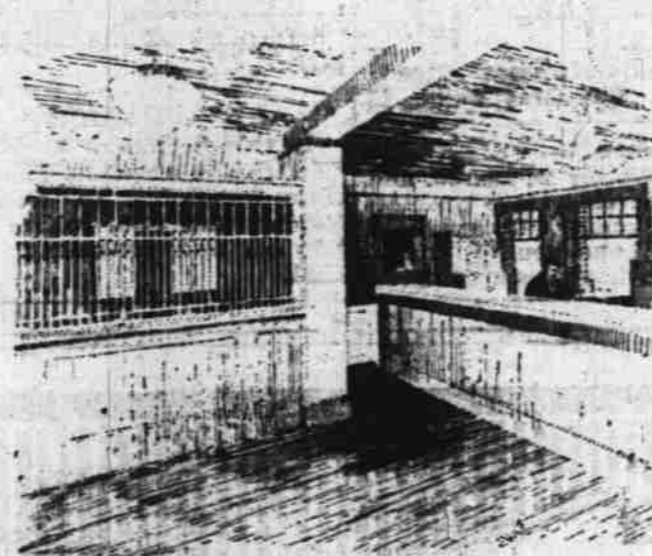
Were funds available, he would start the day after his birthday party, unattended, to New York or Alaska, so greatly does he love travel and its attendant education.

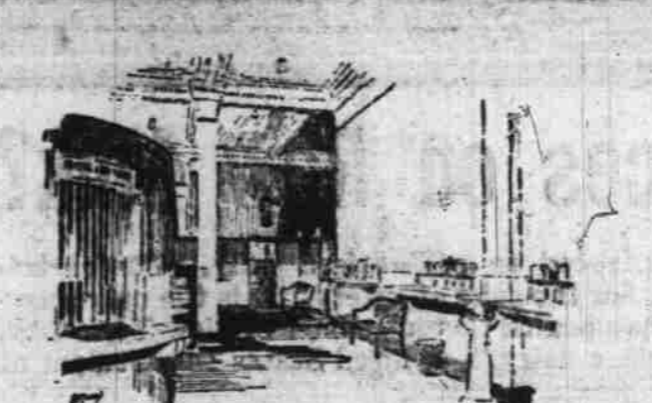
