From July 4 to 10 much of Portland's social life will be centered on entertainment for the delegates and distinguished visitors to the International Christian Endeavor convention. Present indications are that there will be about 15,000 delegates and about 150 leading speakers in the city for the sessions.

The Portland general convention committee, of which Judge Jacob Kansler is chairman, has appointed Mr. Warde W. Robinson as chairman of the reception committee. Mr. Robinson has appointed a committee of 100 leading young people in the Christian Endeavor societies of the city of assist him with the work.

An executive committee selected from among the 100, which is planning details of the entertainment, including Mr. Lorrin Andrews, Mr. Morris Sharp, Mr. Ed-

ward Jones, Miss Mable Frazier, Mr. Hilbert Holloway, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Deik, Miss Doris Ogden, Miss Harriett Ogden, Miss Roberta Orr, Miss Lou McGowan and Miss Vera Hendricks.

An informal reception for members of the official convention party, which includes the United society officers, main convention speakers and the presidents of the state unions, will be held in the Crystal room of the Hotel Benson on Monday night, July 6, following the evening convention session at the Auditorium. Dr. Francis E. Clark, founder of the Christian Endeavor movement and world's president, and Mrs. Clark are to be the guests of honor at this affair. A special program of instrumental and vocal music is being arranged and Dr. Clark will be requested to make a brief address.

Another reception for the women members of the official women from Portland churches on Wednesday afternoon, July 8, in the Multnomah hotel. This will include a social hour and a motor trip around the city.

Mr. Robinson has divided his committee of 100 into 10 groups and named a member of the executive committee as head of each group. Plans have been made for one group to meet every train, boat, electric train or automobile caravan coming to Portland with convention delegates. After welcoming the delegations, the reception committee will pass them on to the committee on pages and guides, who in turn will escort them to convention headquarters for entertainment assignment.

This committee has also made arrangements for special streetcars at the depots to meet the special trains and for all streetcar men and policemen handling the convention crowds to wear official C. E. badges.

The reception committee will also see that the rooms of the official party at the Multnomah hotel are decorated daily with Oregon roses. The final meeting of Mr. Robinson's entire committee of 100 will be next Wednesday at 8 p. m. in the Y.M.C.A. auditorium, when definite assignments will be made to each group.—Portland Journal.

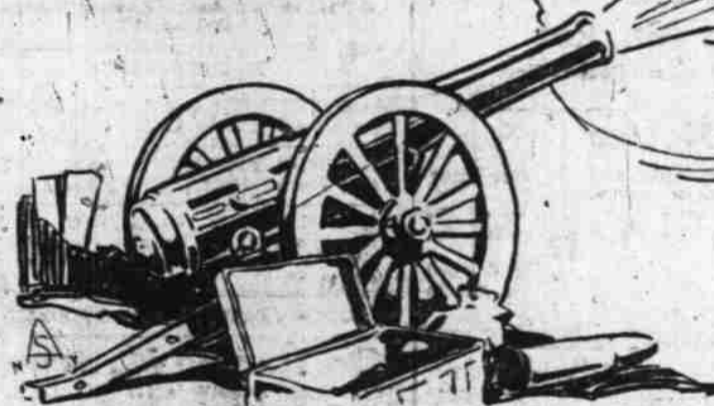
