

INTEREST IN RING MATCHES GREAT

Greb-Walker, and Willis-Weinert Fights to Take Place Tonight

Advance Seat Sale Exceeds \$300,000 Mark; Greb to Risk Middleweight Crown in Walker Fight

NEW YORK, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Harry Greb of Pittsburgh, world's middleweight champion, will risk his crown against Mickey Walker of Elizabeth, N. J., world's welterweight champion, and Harry Willis, negro heavyweight, will trade punches with Charlie Weinert of Newark, N. J., in the two 15-round headline matches at the Tishan hospital fund bouts at the Polo grounds tomorrow night.

This stellar topline program will be augmented by a six-round semi-final between Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo and Dave Shade of California, and a four-round preliminary between Joe Lynch of New York, former world's bantamweight champion, and Chuck Sharkey of New York.

Promoters of the matches said today that the advance seat sale already had exceeded the \$300,000 mark. If a capacity crowd attends the matches, 80,000 people will be in the enclosure.

Four hundred policemen have been detailed to the fight area to keep the throngs moving. The promoters are perturbed over the question of naming an official main bout. Willis and Weinert both have served notice that they expect to go into the ring for the time attraction, while Walker and Greb have scoffed at the idea of turning their world's title match into a semi-windup affair. So this matter has passed on to the state athletic commission, all four principals having agreed to abide by

its decision, which will be given tomorrow afternoon.

While the Greb and Walker match will be a legitimate world's championship match, Willis contends that his position in the heavyweight circles entitles him to a preferred position on the card.

Willis will be the popular favorite to defeat Weinert.

Greb will be an odds-on favorite to retain his world's middleweight crown against the attack of his youthful challenger, Walker, guardian of the world's 147-pound crown.

SPRAY NEEDED FOR MOTH

NUMEROUS EGGS LAID DURING RECENT HOT SPELL

CORVALLIS, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—Numerous eggs of the codling moth have been laid during the last week of warm weather reports the department of entomology of the experiment station. This will make it necessary for those growers in the Willamette valley who have not a good covering of poison over their trees, to spray immediately. Those growers who have sprayed since June 15 will not have to spray again until the middle of July.

The unusual weather during June will result in a split brood of worms which will mean that growers will have to keep a good coating of poison on their fruit at all times.
