SILVERTON, Ore., July 16.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Funeral services were conducted by the Christian Science church at the undertaking parlors Tuesday for Mrs. Nancy Jane Desart who died at Silvertown Monday. Mrs. Desart was born on January 24, 1841 and had lived at Silvertown for the past fifteen years. She was the widow of Dennis Desart and the mother of eight children, three of whom are no longer living. The surviving children are Alfred, Ben, Jerry, Emmett and Harry Desart, all of Silvertown. Interment was in the Silvertown cemetery.

The Governing Board of the Lutheran Brotherhood of Oregon met at Silvertown Tuesday night and in continued session Wednesday morning in consideration of a plan to develop Lutheran student service work in the principal educational centers in Oregon. The plan which was developed will be summarized at the centennial at Bend and at the Luther League convention at Aurora on Sunday, July 19. The students' service proposal will be laid in detail before the All-Lutheran chautauque at Gladstone park near Oregon City next week.

The student service proposal of the Brotherhood contemplates state-wide assistance in developing Lutheran student church homes in each of the chief educational centers beginning with Eugene. One of the requirements will be a suitable church structure in proper location and a man qualified to serve as student pastor. The proposal contemplates a five-year program and, if approved by Lutherans generally, will eventually involve the assembling of funds sufficient to carry on the work.

The Brotherhood is an inter-synodical organization composed of men who are members of various Lutheran Synods, and the proposed Church Homes will be open to students of all Synods and not connected more closely to one Synod than another. The board of governors is scheduled to meet again at Gladstone park on July 27. Members of the governing board are: Rev. Overt Skilbred, Eugene; A. O. Nelson, attorney, Silvertown; Rev. Wm. Carl Loson, Astoria; and Adolph Severson, Chinook, Wash.
