"A SURPLUS OF FLAX YARNS"

Col. W. B. Bartram, in his address to the crowd at Rickreall grove on Wednesday, in the course of the flax tour of inspection of Polk county, under the auspices of the Commercial Club of Dallas, said the plans of the proposed second linen mill for Salem call for the making of 20,000 yards of linen each week, "with a surplus of flax yarns on one eight hour shift."

The making of a surplus of flax yarns is one of the most important of the coming developments of the linen industry of the Salem district-

For upon this will depend the building here of a number of specialty mills. Dr. Deimel is ready now to come to Salem to manufacture here his specialties for the American market; linen mesh garments and hospital towels. He is ready, whenever he can be supplied here with the linen yarns of the proper lea, or fineness. He will employ 1600 people in his American factory. He has now one factory in Germany and two in England. But the American tariff rate of 55 per cent makes it desirable to manufacture in this country the supply of these specialties for the American market.

Dr. Deimel does no spinning. He buys his "yarns," which are the first product of spinning after the scutching of the fiber. There are many mills in Europe that do spinning of yarns only. No doubt the same development will be witnessed here in the course of time.

Anyway, there should be provided here, at the earliest possible time, the yarns for all the specialty mills that need them and will come when they can be furnished.
