Reports from the United States employment office, maintained in the YMCA building indicate that the labor supply is only slightly in excess of the demand. This fact is notable because the berry picking season and the haying season are over with, and generally with the culmination of these two activities, there is felt an increase in the number of unemployed. The report of the bureau for the week ending July 18, shows 186 registrations, 172 calls, 169 referred and 153 placed. Of the women 86 registered, 77 were in demand, 76 referred and 69 placed.
