THE WAR IS NOT OVER FOR THESE

Mrs. Margaret McCluer, national president of the American War Mothers, on Thursday evening placed a magnificent wreath of red, white and blue flowers, grown on the state hospital grounds, at the base of the soldier monument on the Marion county court house grounds.

And this good woman at the head of an organization of loyal women who represent sacrifice in its highest terms, was pleased to testify to the wonderful perfection of the monument which the people of Marion county, under the sponsorship of the American War Mothers of Salem, have provided, and especially the fine setting, with the court house topped with the blind-figure of Justice holding the scales in the background, and the living Christmas tree prominent in the picture.

And Mrs. McCluer was able to testify that the setting is one of the finest in the United States. This she knows, for the discharge of her duties, as she sees them, takes her all over the country.

Under her direction some of the major activities of the American War Mothers are now directed to helping as much as possible the World War veterans who are still in the hospitals and those who are in the prisons of the country; especially those in the federal prisons for crimes connected with breaches of discipline in France during the progress of the war.

Many people think of the war as being over. They think of the men who went to the hospitals of the country as being either cured or dead by this time.

But it is not so. The number is still on the increase. The peak load has not come; the crest of the wave of misery has not yet passed. In February of this year a writer in the Saturday Evening Post gave the number then in the government hospitals of the United States as over 23,000, and over 4250 in state and civil hospitals. Many of the most pitiful cases are left, and are coming in greater numbers than heretofore. They are the men who cannot adjust themselves or be adjusted; the shell shocked, the flotsam and jetsam on the sea of life. The increase in numbers is due to the giving up of the struggle by so many who at first bravely attempted to fight their own battles independently, but who now are finding themselves obliged to come to the point of leaning on the strong arm of the government.

Under the sponsorship of Mrs. McCluer and her co-workers of the American War Mothers, there is being built a memorial home at Fitzsimons hospital near Denver, the largest of the government hospitals. The home has five acres of land, and cottages are being built where mothers and wives of the veterans in the hospital may come for visits, or may live. It is expected that the memorial home may be self supporting, or nearly so; but the people of the country are being called upon by the American War Mothers to provide the funds for the first costs, and they are generously responding. This is expected to lead to other memorial homes.

There is not a salaried officer in the organization of the American War Mothers. The opportunity for service and the labor of love is their pay.

Among the objects of the organization are these: To aid disabled service men and their families; to give hospital relief and entertainment; give Christmas cheer in hospitals and

CHINESE UPRISINGS ARE STIMULUS TO NEW PACT

Treaty of 1921 Reviewed; Other Powers Have Not Yet Made Move

WASHINGTON, July 18.—(By The Associated Press)—Re-examination of the Washington conference commitments regarding China in the light of present conditions in that country and the continuing efforts of the Washington administration to give effect to those commitments through inauguration of the custom commission and the extra territorial inquiry, throws into sharp relief the broad basis worked out here in 1921 upon which to found a permanent solution of the Chinese problem for all signatory or adhering powers.

The Washington policy turns on the effort to convince other governments that recent disturbances in China are merely symptomatic of the same generally unsatisfactory relationships with that country which the Washington conference recognized and proposed to remedy.

It is held here that the Shanghai-Canton and similar incidents only serve to impress upon officials the desirability of getting the Washington conference machinery to work as soon as possible to assist China in the establishment of a strong central government to which foreign nationals could look with assurance of protection.

Recent developments have indicated there is substantial agreement to set up with little delay the custom commission provided for by the nine-power treaty. The American proposal to inaugurate simultaneously the extra territorial inquiry commission still awaits a definite answer from any of the twelve powers to which it has been communicated.
