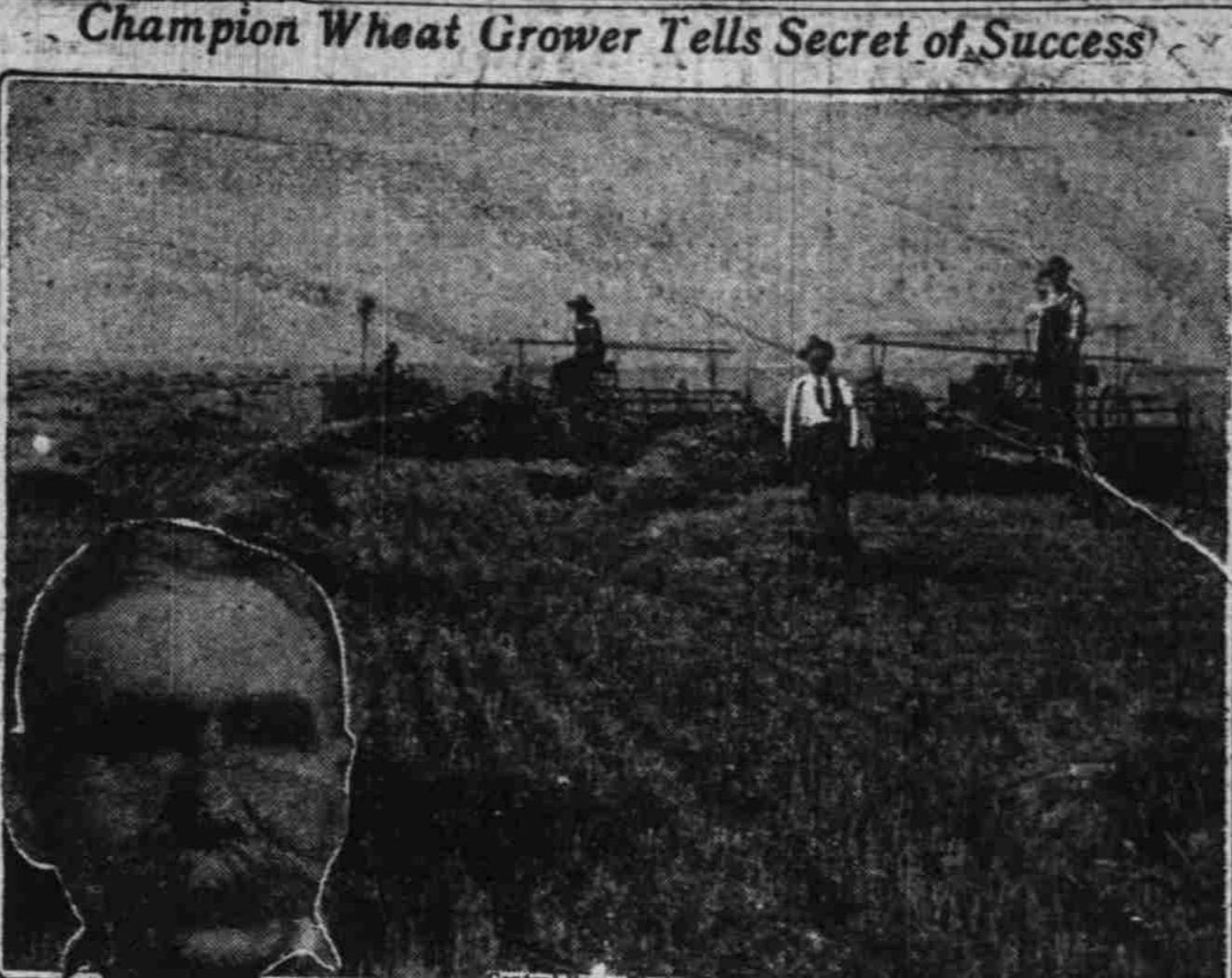

TRAFFIC IS TIED UP SEATTLE CONGESTIONS IS DECLARED WORST IN HISTORY

SEATTLE, July 23.—(By Associated Press).—Illuminated decorations which line Seattle's downtown streets for the triennial convocation of the Knights Templar combined with a new system of illuminated automatic traffic control, caused one of the worst traffic congestions in the city's history.

Cluster lights have been transformed into colored torches, and lighted red crosses hang at close intervals. Motorcycle policemen and reserves were called out to keep automobiles and pedestrians on the move.

STRIKE IS THREATENED BRITISH COAL MINERS MAY GO OUT ON JULY 31

LONDON, July 23.—(By Associated Press).—Great Britain is menaced with a general strike of all the British coal miners on July 31, the miners' executives having decided this evening to instruct the workers to quit work on that date. Meantime, however, the government is bending every effort to bring about negotiations.

W. C. Bridgman, first lord of the admiralty, having won his battle in behalf of the admiralty's cruiser construction program, now is in a position to continue his efforts as a mediator to avert the strike.

The strike decision of the miners' federation is considered a counter to the owners' refusal to withdraw their notices of the termination of the present agreement governing work in coal mines, which expires July 31, as a necessary preliminary to a conference to discuss a new government. The actuality of a mining strike cannot, however, yet be regarded as inevitable.

PEAR CROP SOLD REDDING, Cal., July 23.—(By Associated Press).—The entire crop of pears in the Anderson valley, figured at 500 tons, were sold today, the growers reported, the Popper company of Fresno buying up the bulk of the crop at \$70 a ton. One plot of three acres brought in \$2500.

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STATE TRAINING SCHOOL IS REPRESENTED AT OAC DISPLAY MAINTAINED AT INDUSTRIAL SESSION

Oregon Enterprises Are Well-Represented; Also Some From California

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis—The state training school for boys is represented at the industrial conference here for the industries of Oregon by W. W. Craig, instructor of manual training. The conference was called by A. R. Nichols, state supervisor of vocational education, July 21 to 31.

The conference is for men in industry who have instructor responsibilities. The work taken up will be of importance to men who know their trade and who care to know more efficient methods of putting it across to other men. The conference will take up methods of instruction, methods of getting out lesson plans, methods of presentation, job analysis, and other points of interest to instructors in industry.

The conference is being conducted by Charles R. Allen, editor and consultant of the federal board for vocational education. Mr. Allen comes direct from Fort Collins, Col., where he has been conducting research work concerning certain vocational courses. Many industries are represented. Mr. Allen has had many years of trade and school teaching so is especially qualified for conducting a conference of this type.
