

MANY PUT ON WEIGHT TRAINING AT CAMP LEWIS PROVES BENEFICIAL

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., July 25.—(Special.)—The 650 young men from Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho who last week completed a month's training at the citizens' military training camp at Camp Lewis carried home with them, in the aggregate, over one and one-half tons more of solid flesh than when they came to camp. Silverton

SILVERTON, July 25.—(Special to The Statesman)—Funeral services for Mrs. Monte Nickell were held from the Jack and Ekman mortuary Thursday afternoon at two-thirty. Rev. J. A. Bennett officiating. Interment was in the Bethany cemetery. Mrs. Nickell died Monday at the Marlon Palmer ranch where she and her husband had lived but one month. Beside her husband she leaves three children, all of whom live in California.

Word was received by relatives in Silverton Saturday that Charles Benson died at Lothair, Montana early Saturday morning after several years' illness. A brother, Rudd Benson, of this city arrived in Lothair a few hours before his brother's death. Mr. Benson was the son of Mrs. Olivia Benson of Silverton and made his home here until he moved to Montana several years ago. He and his wife and three children were planning to make their home at Silverton again in the near future. Funeral plans are not completed but it is understood the body will be brought to Silverton for burial.

Wrestling fans who were present at the match between Robin Reed and Paul Amort at the Hippodrome, July 10, will again have an opportunity of seeing Reed in action here. The weekly band concerts given in the Silverton park each Thursday evening by the 4L band are taking the place of a chataqua this summer and are supported by contributions from business firms and citizens of the city. A recent report shows that contributions have amounted to nearly \$750, the largest sum being \$100 given by the Silver Falls Timber company by which many of the band members are employed.

Much is being done at Silverton in the building line at present. A number of new homes are under construction as well as garages and other small buildings. Among the larger structures are the Webb warehouse near the railroad bridge, the city hall on Water street, the Inman building at the corner of Oak and First and the addition to the Eugene Field school building. Building permits issued at Silverton for the first six months of the year made a total of \$131,300.

COLLEGE RUMORS HEARD MENNONITES MAY CHOOSE SALEM FOR NEW SCHOOL

There is a rumor stirring about the streets of Salem to the effect that this city may be chosen as the site of a new Mennonite college which is to be built, if not in Salem, somewhere else on the Pacific slope. MIAMI, Fla., July 25.—(By Associated Press).—The Miami Daily News will issue a 504 page edition tomorrow in observance of the formal opening of its new \$1,500,000 home and the 29th anniversary of the city.

The edition includes fifteen color sections of 24 pages each, besides the regular comics and magazine in color. Approximately 1000 illustrations which, with the news matter, would be the equivalent of 35 bound volumes of ordinary book size, are supported by a volume of advertising placed by more than 1500 business concerns and individuals for a total of \$13,036 lines.

BRYAN SCORES ATHEISTS DARWINISM DERIVED IN ADDRESS; ATTACK CARRIED ON

WINCHESTER, Tenn., July 25.—(By Associated Press).—William Jennings Bryan was derisive of evolutionists in an address here today. He declared the attacks made on him at the Dayton trial of J. T. Scopes were the outcropping of a fight his enemies had been carrying on in the dark and said he was benefitted by it. He spoke of the evolution controversy as a "crusade for the enlightenment of the people."

Asserting that Darwinism "has a chilling influence on students," Mr. Bryan said: "When a Christian wants to teach christianity he has to build his own college, but the atheist expects to usurp public colleges and schools."

BARGAIN ON LICENSES PRICES ON DOGS WILL BE DOUBLED AUGUST 1

All dog licenses sold after August 1 will cost the applicant double the regular amount, it was declared by the county clerk yesterday. But in spite of this high rate, each license will be a bargain, the sheriff's office stated. After the first of the month licenses for males will go to \$2 and \$4 will have to be paid to secure a tag for a female.

The economic advantage of securing licenses for dogs, even at a premium, lies in the fact that each unlicensed animal will cost its owner a \$10 fine after August 1. Beginning on that date deputies will canvass the county and check on a list prepared by the county clerk. The owners of all unlicensed dogs have been tabulated, and when these people are visited, if they have not yet secured a license, they will be arrested and fined \$10 in each case. If a license is not then taken out, the dog will be killed. Only dogs over eight months of age require tags.

This new law relating to the application for licenses was passed by the 1925 legislature, and went into effect on May 25. Next year all licenses must be purchased by January 1. In the event that a person buys or comes into the possession of a dog during the year, a license for it must be obtained within 30 days.

Long Pilgrimage Made to City of Rome Afoot

ROME—Thousands of devout Catholics have made Holy Year pilgrimages to Rome, but few have come in the manner in which the word truly connotes. One such, however, has been completed by Luisa Cruces, a Spanish woman living in Morocco with her three children, whose ages are seven, four and two years. Senora Cruces left Morocco with her little brood on December 9, 1924, and they made practically the whole journey on foot. They started with 25 pesetas in their possession, and throughout the trip they had no other means of support, except from the sale of picture postcards showing their photograph. For the most part they slept on the grass under the stars or along the sand beaches, but occasionally they were taken in by kind people along their route. They have received the special

Holy Year benediction from Pope Pius XI. Workers in India Benefit by Drive Against Liquor LONDON—Prohibition measures in India have greatly improved the condition of the working classes, in the opinion of C. V. Mehta, a member of the executive council of Bombay, who arrived in England recently on a visit. Mr. Mehta, who was formerly minister in charge of excise, estimated that in Bombay the drinking was about a third less than before the dry campaign began. During strikes or any serious trouble, Mr. Mehta said, all liquor shops in Bombay are closed. Three years ago during the non-cooperation movement, when volunteers picketed liquor shops in Bombay and Poona, there was practically no consumption of alcoholics for five months, and the authorities found that the condition of the workers had distinctly improved. "The majority of Indians have virtually been abstainers for centuries, so it was easy for us to work toward prohibition at a quicker rate," said Mr. Mehta, "and in two and a half years we were able to reduce consumption from 2,800,000 gallons to 1,800,000 and there has been a relative improvement in the condition of the masses as a result."
