### COURTROOM IS JAMMED FOR ZIELINSKI TRIAL

**HAZEL GREEN FARMER IS ACCUSED BY SALEM GIRL**

**Case Is First To Be Tried Under Recent Addition to Oregon Statutes**

In a jammed courtroom, before an audience constituted mainly of young girls and callow youths, all the testimony was gone through yesterday in the action against Raymond Zielinski, accused by Helen Ganiard, of Salem, of being the father of her child. The case was concluded yesterday afternoon and will go to the jury this morning. Zielinski is a young farmer of the Hazel Green district.

The courtroom was packed. All available seats were taken, and during most of the trial the corridor leading to the room was filled. Of the grown people, the audience was composed about equally of men and women. Many boys and girls were present, some of them scarcely out of their teens. The evidence offered was odious and abhorrent.

The private prosecutor, a girl just over 21, testified with her mother occupied seats behind the railing separating the bar from the courtroom. The defendant was seated near his attorneys. The girl carried her baby in her arms.

The action, which is of a quasi-criminal nature, is the first to come up under a recent addition to the Oregon statutes. The law provides that when an illegitimate child is born, its father can be forced to give it his name and be forced to support it. In the event of his death, the child inherits his property in the same proportion as any legitimate children he may have.

Evidence offered by attorneys for the plaintiff attempted to prove that Zielinski was the father of the child. This was disputed by his lawyers. The case was closed yesterday. The jury will report this morning.

**NORMAN KERRY HURT WHEN HORSE BREAKS LOOSE**

PENDLETON, July 27.—Injuries in the groin and ribs were sustained by Norman Kerry, motion picture star, here yesterday when the cinch broke on a wild horse and the animal knocked Kerry down. He was unconscious for a time but was improving today. In the accident the horse charged against Edward Sedgewick, picture director, and kicked him over, besides upsetting a camera. The accident occurred during one of the scenes in a play which was being filmed.
