

**DEMPSEY-MADDEN BOUT  
TALK GAINS ATTENTION**

**POSSIBILITY OF MATCH IS  
HEIGHTENED BY MEETING**

Madden's Manager Will Hold Conference With Promoter Fitzsimmons

NEW YORK, July 30.—Possibility of a heavyweight championship fight this year at Michigan City, Ind., between Jack Dempsey and Bartley Madden was revived today with the departure of Charley Rose, Madden's manager for a conference in Chicago with Promoter Floyd Fitzsimmons.

Rose left here late in the afternoon in response to a message from Fitzsimmons. He pointed out that Dempsey, on his arrival here from Europe, virtually had signified his willingness to meet Madden this fall. The champion has been quoted also as saying that Fitzsimmons had first call on his services for a September contest.

Indications of Dempsey's disapproval of Harry Greb as an opponent in a fight this year increases Madden's chances of obtaining a title match, in the estimation of close followers of the ring.

Coincident with the departure of Rose came word from the Pacific coast that Jack Kearns, manager of the champion, is hastening east. As manager of Demp-

sey, he is recognized by the New York athletic commission as authorized to sign for a Harry Willis bout.

Since the board has issued an ultimatum to Dempsey and Kearns regarding a fight with Willis, observers here believe that Kearns' visit will either bring forth articles for the match or the dethroning of Dempsey in New York state by the commission.

**POLITICAL FIELD WARM**

**SCHUMAN DELIVERS ULTIMATUM TO LA FOLLETTE, JR.**

WATERTOWN, Wis., July 30.—(By Associated Press)—State Senator John C. Schuman of Watertown, one of the anti-Blaine progressive leaders in the legislature, tonight issued a statement declaring "an attempt to cram a candidate down the throats of a people runs against the grain of true Americanism. Autocracy, bossism, monarchy, hereditary and succession will not rule in Wisconsin," and declares "progressivism camouflage" in the dress of "personal ambition" is bound "to be damned."

**ALLEGED KIDNAPERS SAY  
THIRD DEGREE WAS USED**

**CONFESSIONS OBTAINED BY  
BRUTAL MEANS, CHARGE**

State Presents Evidence to Prove Beatings Were Not Administered

LOS ANGELES, July 30.—The prosecution in the case of three men charged with having conspired to kidnap Mary Pickford, film star, and hold her for a ransom of \$200,000, spent virtually the whole of today's session presenting testimony designed to refute a defense contention that confessions alleged to have been made by the defendants were obtained through the use of third degree methods.

Sharply contrasted with yesterday, when hundreds of persons crowded the hall of records to catch a glimpse of Mary Pickford as she appeared in court, today's session was dull and drab. Some of the spectators even went to sleep during the warm afternoon in the courtroom which yesterday was jammed with a surging and craning throng.

Witnesses today included John J. Hill, the deputy district attorney, who presented the case before the grand jury, and William Evans, a masseur at an athletic club.

Evans testified that Harry Raymond, a private detective who worked on the case, sprained his wrist last May, three days before the arrest of the defendants, Adrian Wood, Claude Holcomb and C. Z. Stephens. The testimony was presented in an effort to prove that the detective was unable to administer beatings to the defendants, as contended by the defense.

The state's star witness, Louis Geck, known as "Louie the Spider," probably will be called tomorrow, the prosecution indicated late today. Most of the evidence upon which the state's case is based was gathered by Geck associating with the alleged plotters.

**AIRSHIP ENTERS HANGAR**

LAKEHURST, N. J., July 30.—The navy dirigible Shenandoah, returning from maneuvers with the fleet off the Virginia coast, was placed in its hangar at 7:40 o'clock tonight, 22 minutes after Commander Lansdowne had ordered the trail ropes dropped. This reduced by 15 minutes the former record of getting the airship into its hangar.
