ABLE CASE CONTINUED

CHARGE WILL BE PRESSED IN MUNICIPAL COURT

Hearing in the justice court of the case against Ray Able, Silverton man charged with violation of the prohibition law, was yesterday continued following the decision of city prosecutors that charges against him would be pressed in the city police court. Continuance of the case in the justice court at the request of state prosecutors is in accordance with the policy of the district attorney's office against duplicating with trial by the state of cases tried before a municipal court.

The nature of the charge of charges to be filed in the police court was not definitely announced yesterday. On the police blotter he is booked on three counts: drunkenness, possession of liquor, and driving a car while intoxicated. Unable to post bail, Able has been held in the city jail since his arrest Saturday night with the exception of the time spent in the county jail. After City Attorney Kowitz had turned the case over to state attorneys for prosecution.

CHEMIST SAID MURDERED

INVESTIGATORS FIND CLUES POINTING TO KILLING

MARTINEZ, Cal., July 31.—(By Associated Press).—Discovery of clues indicating that Charles Henry Schwartz, Berkeley chemist, was murdered and was not a victim of an accidental explosion last night in the laboratory of the Pacific cellulose, prompted county officials today to postpone indefinitely an inquest into the case in order to permit a thorough investigation.

Investigators, upon reaching the scene of the explosion, made the following discoveries which point to murder:

An oil soaked rag or blanket apparently laid under the head of the dead man.

Blood stains in an adjoining room, 20 feet distant, from the body was found, and blood stains on the stair leading to the laboratory.

Two cuts on the back of the head.

E. O. Heinrich, Berkeley criminologist, was summoned by county investigators to make an analysis of the blood stains and make an examination of the body.

Investigators were also looking into the possibility that the body found in the building was not that of Schwartz and another body had been substituted. The chemist's life was covered by \$190,000 in insurance, officials said. The body, however, was burned so badly that recognition was almost impossible.
