## **Packard Driven From Los Angeles to New York**



Licentenant Leigh Wade, pilot of the airplane Boston, on the U. S. army's around-the-world flight, scated at the wheel of his Packard eight car in which he drove from Los Angeles to New York over a route 3600 miles long without once stopping the car. Standing beside the car is Linton Wells, news-paper man who was his companion on the trip. Wells is the man who stowed away in Wade's plane at Calcutta, India and rode 3,000 miles. The non-stop cross country run was made under the auspices of the American Automobile Association. The average speed for the entire trip was scheduled at 24.5 miles an hour as one of the most important features of the drive was the plan for an unswerving ob-servance of the law over the full distance. The slow speed made the test of both the motor car and the lighway system even more difficult,




