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RECLAIMING OF ACREAGE ROAD PETITION FILED

SCAPPOOSE FILES DRAINAGE PLANS WITH ENGINEER

On July 31 the Scappoose drainage district filed with the state engineer an application for the approval of their plan of reclamation which is required before the construction contract may be let.

Description: 5,762 acres Columbia river bottom land lying between the Willamette lowland and the multnomah channel, and the high ground to the west. It is 20 miles north of Portland, and directly east of the town of Scappoose.

The land will be protected from the annual overflow from the river by means of dikes surrounding the district and the water inside the dike will be removed by means of gates and pumps.

TRAVEL ON CHAMPEOG ROUTE IS GETTING HEAVY

A petition asking that the road to the Champeog state park be graveled has been presented to the Marion county court by members of road district 61.

The petitioners state that unusually heavy travel is now going on over the road and that large numbers of people visit the park each Sunday. A large amount of money could be saved now, they say, if gravel was used.

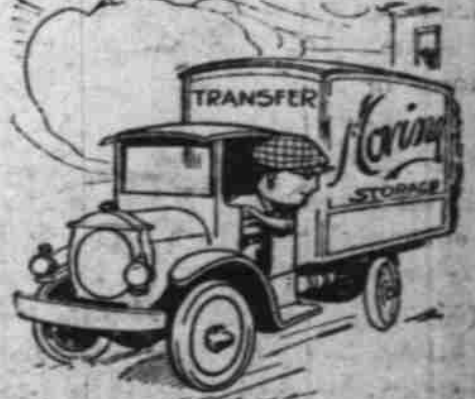
