IT isn't enough for Lillian Eichler to have achieved the reputation of one of the foremost authorities upon etiquette and to be the author of "The Customs of Mankind," but she must add to her laurels the distinction of being advisory editor of "Fashionable Dress" as well as a radio speaker of note.

These claims to fame are secondary in importance, Miss Eichler feels, to her domestic achievements and among her friends her culinary skill is as well known as her literary ability.

She is particularly successful with desserts which she considers should never be too heavy and therefore prefers those that are delicate rather than too rich.

For that reason she is fond of gelatins which she uses in many different ways. One of her favorite recipes is given.

**Chocolate Charlotte**  
5 cups Boiling Water  
1 cup Evaporated Milk  
1/2 cup Cream (scalded)  
1/4 squares Chocolate  
1/2 cup Cold Water  
1/2 cup Sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. Gelatine  
Vanilla

Soak the gelatine in cold water, add scalded cream to it while it is hot, and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Melt chocolate over hot water, add sugar and then the boiling water a little at a time. Add slowly to gelatine mixture while both are hot. Cool and add the evaporated milk and 1 tsp. of vanilla, and when well mixed pour in a fancy molds lined with lady fingers.
