DEBT TO BE DISCUSSED THE QUESTION OF REFUNDING BELGIAN DEBT CONSIDERED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—The refunding of Belgium's \$480,000,000 war debt to the United States will be taken up formally Monday by the American and Belgian debt commission.

Almost simultaneously with the fixing today of the date for these negotiations, information reached American government officials that France proposed to send a debt commission here next month.

The American commission held its first formal meeting today since last December to consider a conservative statement regarding Belgium's ability to pay. Capacity to pay will be the yardstick by which the agreement with debtors or nations will be measured.

Chairman Mellon and other members of the American commission are not yet advised as to the proposals the Belgians will make, but any plan to separate Belgium's war and post war debts to this country with Germany held responsible for the former could not be seriously considered.

SUPPORT ASKED FOR MONROE DOCTRINE

United States Should Receive Declaration From South, Is Believed

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Declaration that the United States is ready to fight for the Monroe doctrine, but that it should strive to get from the countries of Central and South America a joint or separate declaration in support of the doctrine, was made at an open conference of the institute of politics today by Professor George H. Blakeslee of Clark university.

In discussion which followed the conference on this country's foreign policy, Professor C. K. Leith of the University of Wisconsin said that "industrial imperialism" was going forward in the countries to the south of us and that it was well to accept that fact and not talk about "the evils of dollar diplomacy."

Responsible officials had held, Mr. Blakeslee recalled that the Monroe doctrine was for defense and not for offense. The Latin American countries were suspicious of over-lordism and tutelage on the part of the United States. This suspicion should be removed if possible and this government, while holding its rights to define, interpret and apply the Monroe doctrine, should persuade the American states to declare it their own policy in such terms as they choose.

KLAN DAYS ARE DENIED EXPOSITION REFUSES TO SET ASIDE CERTAIN DAYS

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—A request from the Ku Klux Klan to set aside three days during the sesqui-centennial exposition here next year as "klan days" was refused today by the executive committee of the exposition.

In declining to recognize the klan as an order at the independence celebration, Ernest T. Trigg, president of the exposition, wrote Paul M. Winter, local field representative of the klan: "It would be neither good business nor good policy to authorize special days which, for any reason, good or bad, might lead to misunderstandings or prejudices, and accordingly, although the necessity is regretted, your request cannot be allowed."

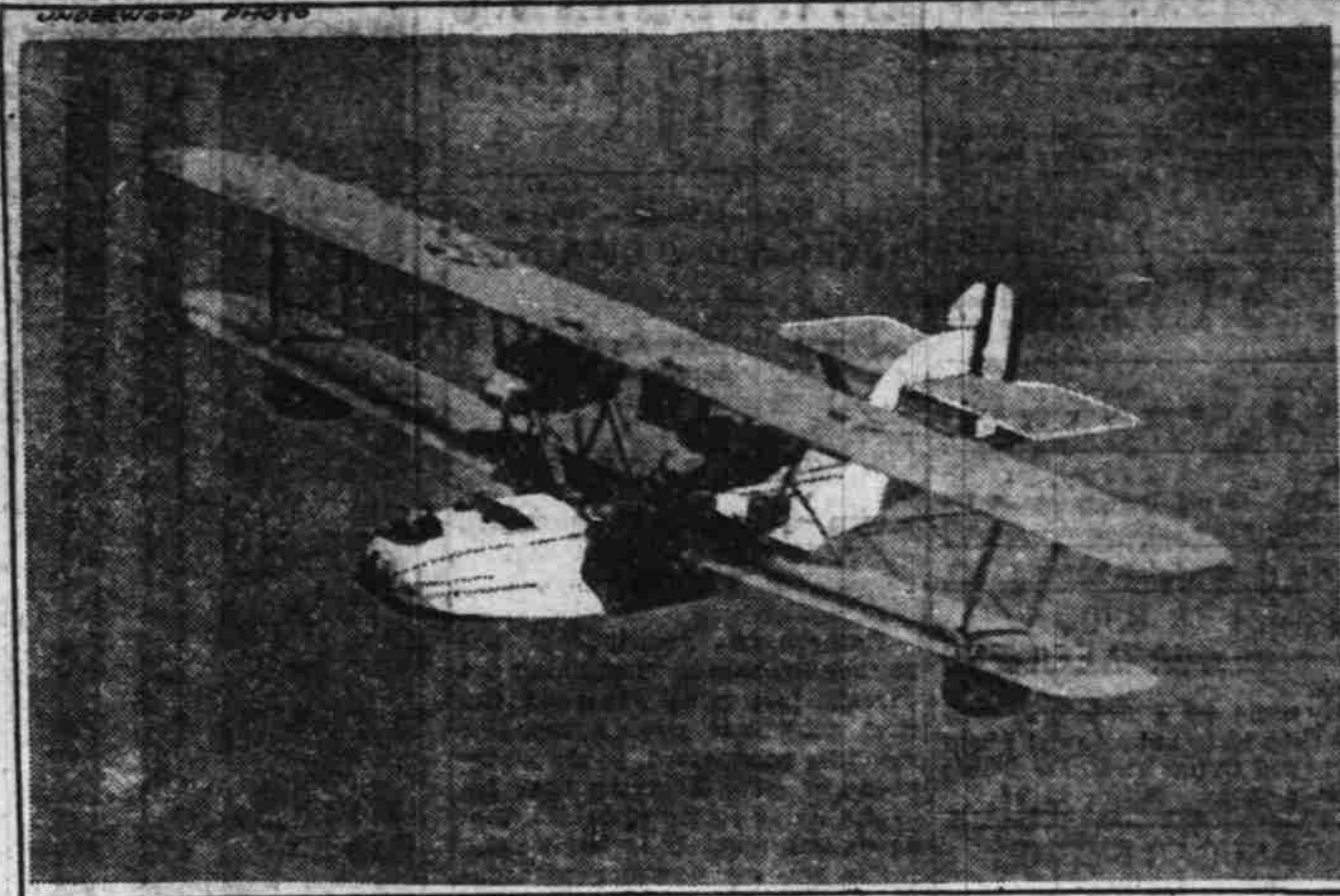
MATRICIDE MUST DIE MAN CONVICTED OF BEATING MOTHER, 73, TO DEATH

RENO, Nev., Aug. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—John H. On Gold Pan creek, where William Grady made the strike, he and his partner named Ford obtained 117 ounces of gold in 15 days. Next above Grady and Ford on the creek a claim owned by Judge William G. Thomas of this city and worked by three employes is producing about equally well.

On the claim of R. D. Brunnon, the second below the Grady-Ford tract, \$20 worth of gold per day per man was being removed when the last news started from the district. The 15th, 16th and 17th claims below the discovery, which are owned by Albert Bease and partners, were yielding \$25 daily per man.

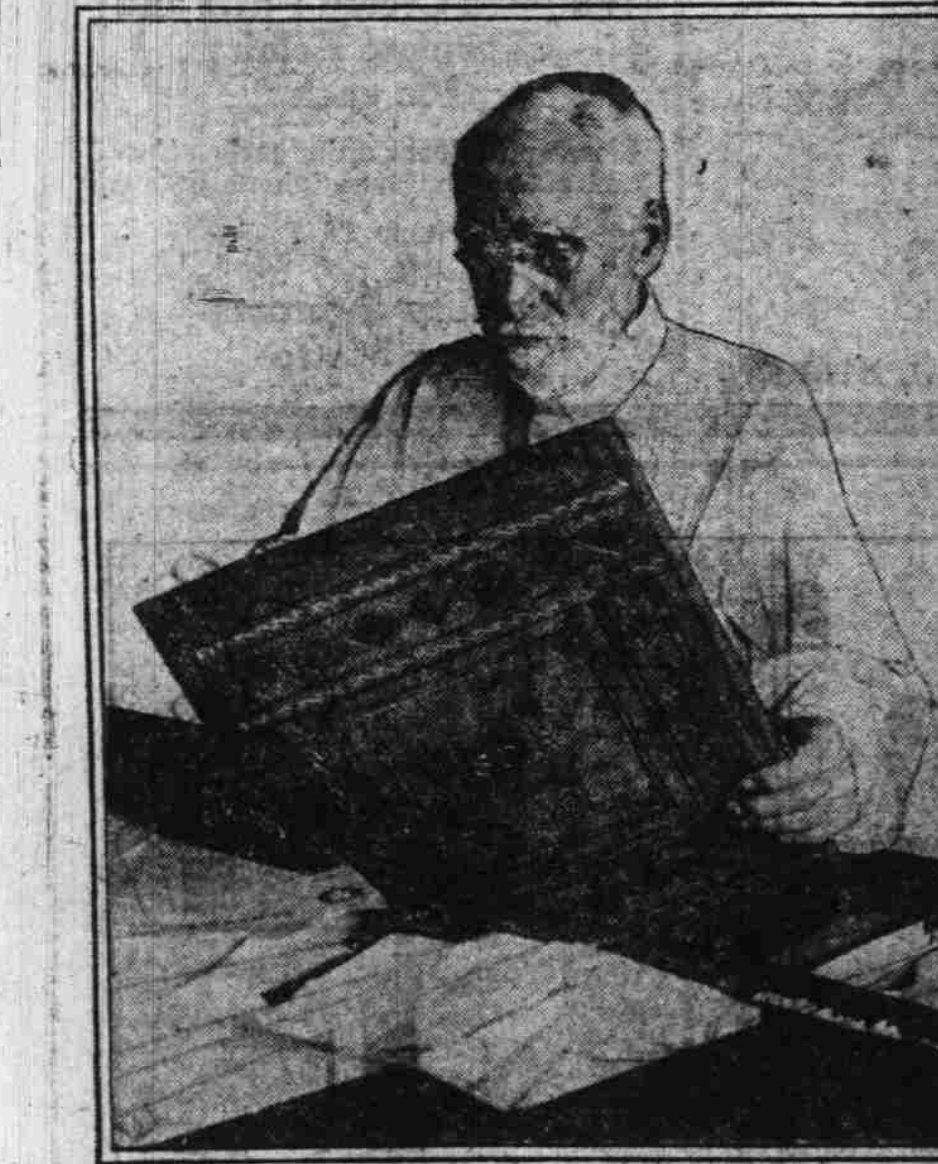
