SILVER CREEK FIRE IS UNDER CONTROL

Mill Employes Are Fighting Blaze; Fires in Slashings Are Numerous

SILVERTON, Ore., Aug. 6.—(Special).—Fire reports about the Silver Falls Timber company woods are somewhat exaggerated, according to reports given out by company officials Thursday morning. The fire, which began Monday, damaged three donkey engines and some fallen timber, but by Tuesday was under the control of the Silver Falls employes. The high wind Wednesday afternoon is said to have spread it to some extent. However, it is reported to be under the control of the men again.

The fire is burning about Bridge creek and in the slashings in the direction of Mehama. Fire is also burning in the old slashings of the Silverton Lumber company mill but no damage is reported from there. As the Silverton Lumber company is not operating and has no men in the woods, F. W. Ferguson, fire warden, has a crew of men stationed there.

KALISPELL, Mont., Aug. 6.—A forest fire in Glacier National Park between Belton and Lake McDonald is sweeping up the mountainside tonight and tourists are leaving the district. The blaze started last night in some slashings of the Slack Lumber company.

Park road crews and all other available help are fighting the fire. Another fire was reported here tonight at the head of Lake McDonald.

WALLACE, Idaho, Aug. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Forest officials reported general improvement in the forest fire situation in the Coeur d'Alene district tonight but declared that only a heavy rain will entirely remove the danger.

The most serious fire in the district today was in the North Fork country, which is threatening to spread to a stand of 500,000,000 feet of commercial pine timber. The Pine Creek fire was

CATHOLICS WILL MEET

EUCCHARISTIC COUNCIL WILL BE HELD NEXT JUNE

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—What is expected to be the largest religious meeting in history, which will be attended by the largest party of church dignitaries that ever left Rome, including ten cardinals from the holy city, will be held in Chicago June 20-24, next, the Knights of Columbus were informed at the closing session of their 43rd annual supreme convention here today by Monsignor C. J. Quille, general secretary of the national eucharistic council.

The eucharistic council, Manager Quille told the delegates, is expected to be the greatest religious meeting in history, with an estimated attendance between one and two million persons. June 22 an evening celebration for 100,000 men will be held, Manager Quille said. Fifty thousand parochial school children are now being trained to sing the mass of the angels in solemn pontifical high mass in the arena of Grant park stadium.

For the second time delegates refused to authorize a tubercular sanitarium or homes for aged knights. The sanctuary of Our Sorrowful Mother in Portland, Ore., was approved as a worthy project.

CHICAGO "WET" CENTER

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE WILL OPEN HEADQUARTERS

CHICAGO.—The Anti-Saloon League of America will open its convention here the first day after the November election, which F. Scott McBride, general superintendent, said would have an important bearing on the future program of the league. The league has not met here since 1909, when national interest was directed towards Illinois because of the development of the local option movement.

"Now Illinois, and particularly

Chicago, has become the center of national interest because this state has been made the center of wet movements to break down prohibition enforcement," the league said.

The convention will come to Chicago at the invitation of the Chicago Church Federation.

On Sunday, Nov. 8, scores of regular Anti-Saloon League speakers will occupy the pulpits at the morning services in the churches of Chicago, and the leading cities of Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, Iowa and Wisconsin. Bishop Thomas Nicholson of Detroit, national president, will preside. The bishop and Mr. McBride formerly were located here.
