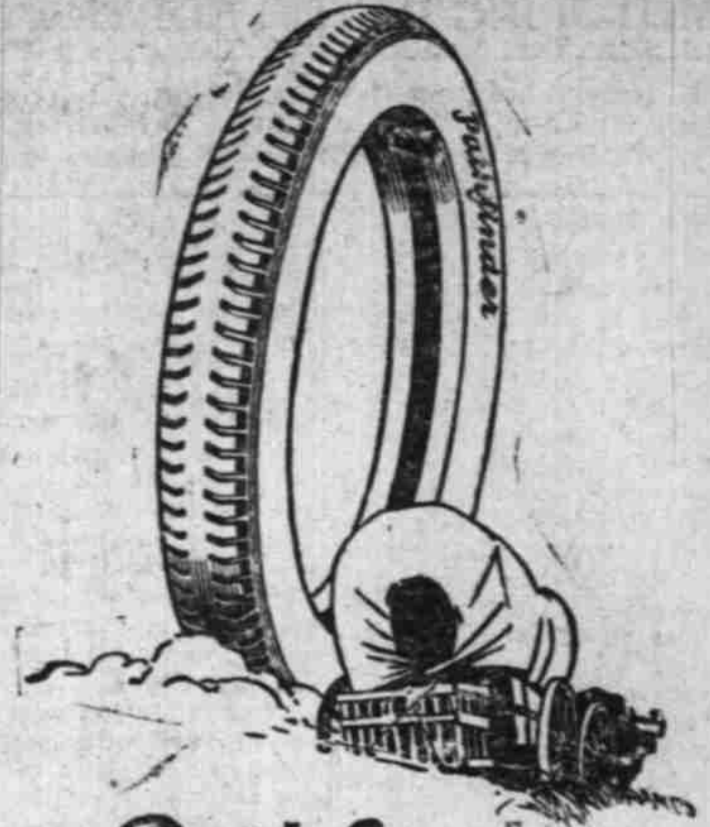

Where Navy Will Build Great Pacific Air Base



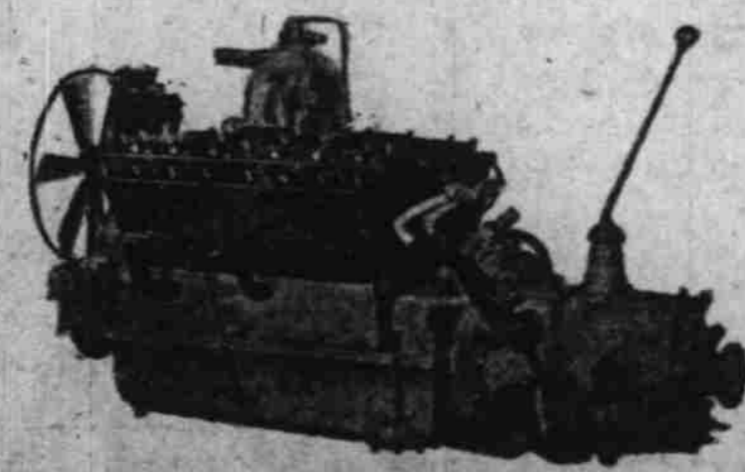
