Canine Actor, Known Over Europe, Is Leader of Whirl-gig Group

"Toque" is coming to this city Saturday, August 29, with Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey circus. "Toque" is just a dog, but by no means a common dog. He has no pedigree, but he has a reputation that extends all over Europe and he has made a fortune for Alfred Loyal, who owns him.

"Toque" is a wonderful equestrian. He turns single and double somersaults on a horse's back, stands on his head in the saddle, and while sitting upright on the horse's back catches on his nose, rings and clown caps tossed to him by Loyal. While the trainer stands in the saddle he perches himself, head down, on the man's head.

"Toque" is also a wonderful acrobat. He runs down an incline and, after turning somersaults in midair, goes hurling through a paper hoop. "Toque" is the star of a troupe of twenty dogs including "Chiquita," the funniest of all canine actors. At the conclusion of their tricks a dozen of the swiftest race around the top of the ring bank curb, just as chariots encircle the hippodrome track. DEATH FACED CALMLY

SIMMONS DIES FOR MURDER; INNOCENCE PROTESTED

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 11.—(By Associated Press.)—Protesting his innocence to the end, Walter R. Simmons, former Montana cowboy, deputy sheriff and baseball player was electrocuted at the Nebraska state penitentiary early today for the murder of Frank Pahl, a garage man of Spencer, Neb.

Just before Simmons walked to the chair he gave out the following statement to the press:

"There are but a few moments left. There is a life hereafter, and if I were leaving this world with a lie upon my tongue I wouldn't have the chance that I would have if I told the truth. Realizing it to be true above all things, I can only say that I am innocent. I am speaking without prejudice against anyone. All is forgiven by me, and I ask forgiveness. I ask forgiveness of you if such is possible.

After the electrocution former Judge E. P. Holmes, his chief counsel, said he would continue his hunt for the "slayer of Frank Pahl." He said that "an innocent man was electrocuted this morning."
