### WOMAN'S BODY IS FOUND

**LIBERTY BONDS AND RINGS ARE FOUND NEAR BODY**

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Aug. 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Stripped of clothing and wrapped in rags, the body of an unidentified woman, believed to have been murdered, was found buried in a rock crevice in the hills about two miles north of Blue Water, 75 miles west of Albuquerque, Tuesday, it became known here today. Liberty bonds and rings found near the body furnished the only clew as to identity. The bonds of \$375 valuation bear the name of Mrs. Stella Oliver, San Fernando, Cal. Four rings were found in the clothing and on the hands. The body was found buried under a pile of rocks about 150 yards from a road which branches from the main highway. It is believed that the woman had been dead for at least a month. Decomposition rendered a description rendered a description extremely difficult. She is described however, as about 40 years old and weighing about 100 pounds. No marks of violence could be found on the body, according to officials.
