Matter Now to Go to Congress for Formal Acceptance of Settlement

SIGNATURE IS OBTAINED

Important Documents Are Rushed to White House by Special Train; Conference Completed

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Aug. 20.—(By Associated Press.)—President Coolidge tonight approved the Belgian debt settlement.

The agreement, rushed from Washington to Swampscott in a special mail pouch, was brought from the summer White House to Northampton in a White House automobile by E. C. Geleser, personal stenographer for the president.

Immediately after the president had signed the agreement, Mr. Geleser left for Swampscott so as to have the document placed in the mail pouch, which was to go forward to Washington tonight from Swampscott.

GUNMAN-BOOTLEGGER RAISED DEFENSE FUND, SAID

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—William Darling Shepherd, foster father and principal heir of William Nelson McClintock and recently acquitted of young McClintock's murder, today formally denied reports from Colorado that Louis Alterie, alleged beer runner and Chicago gunman, had provided \$75,000 for Shepherd's defense.

Shepherd's attorney is reported on a vacation on Alterie's Colorado ranch.

"It is just some more bunk," Shepherd said. "I don't believe Stewart said it. I have never seen Alterie and I have never had the slightest contact with him."

The funds spent was raised by him and by Robert Stoll, his law partner, Shepherd said.
