A MEETING OF INTEREST to club women throughout the county was held yesterday afternoon at the Child Health Demonstration building on State street. The meeting was called to order by Mrs. E. E. Fisher, who has recently been appointed by the county federation president—Mrs. W. W. Allen of Mill City—as chairman of child welfare work in the county. The appointment goes to a club worker of particular capability in this line. Mrs. Fisher has been active in this type of work for more than six years, having been the organizer of the child health clinics that have been conducted in Salem from year to year since 1919.

At the meeting yesterday afternoon, with a splendid representation present, the work of the five year Child Health Demonstration program for Marion county was outlined and the part which county club women can play made clear to them. The object of the meeting was to bring about a closer relationship between the seven district nurses and the health committees of the communities in which they will operate. A special object of the Demonstration workers is to be able to work through organizations already in existence. Dr. Walter H. Brown stressed the ideal of getting people to think in terms of health rather than sickness, to learn to consider the medical profession not as a rescue squad, but as a preventative force. Both Elanora Thompson and Dr. Stella Ford Warner enlarged upon phases of the work already introduced.

## DRY ORGANIZATION IS NOW COMPLETE

ment of the new dry staff was the appointment of Walton A. Green, former army officer, who assisted Mr. Andrews, who served as a brigadier general during the war in the formation of the military police in France, as the chief prohibition investigator, a new office, and the sending to the San Francisco district as federal administrator of E. C. Yellowley, chief of general prohibition agents whose office is abolished.

Mr. Green, who also is a former publisher of the Boston Journal, will be charged with the building up of a highly trained group of investigators, who will work on big conspiracy cases. They will be the "eyes in the field" for General Andrews to determine what results are being obtained from the expenditure of millions of dollars to enforce prohibition.

Besides Chief Investigator Green, the new appointees include Frederick Buford, former traffic manager of the Bessemer and Lake Erie railroad who will be in charge of the Pittsburgh district; Halsey Dunwoody, formerly a colonel in the army, who has been engaged in business in France, in charge at Tampa; Herbert H. White, former army officer at Fort Worth, Texas; Robert E. Frith, former army officer at Los Angeles, and A. J. Hanlon, former army officer at San Juan, Porto Rico.

Administrators appointed include Elias Marsters, former director for Idaho, Helena district, and Roy C. Lyle, former director of Washington state for the Seattle district.
