boy movement. To find the right program for boys, we have held many conferences and discussed many plans, but none seemed feasible. Finally the program of the Boy Scouts of America was investigated and in that program was exactly what was needed as far as boy training outside of religion was concerned. Conferences with the Boy Scout organization at Portland developed the information that the organization would gladly turn its entire program, as such, over to the Lutheran church for its use, and with the privilege of adding to that program any religious program that might be desired. The boy movement of the Lutheran church will therefore use the program of the Boy Scouts of America and its 'Handbook for Boys,' and follow the rules and regulations just as they are."
