ANXIETY FELT OVER FATE OF AVIATORS

(Continued from page 1)

speed of 27 knots an hour; the aircraft tender, Aroostook; the tender, Tanager; the mine sweeper, Sunadun; two submarines, the R-2 and the R-10, and various other craft.

All were spurred by the hope that they might reach the tea on air aviation before she sinks; and by the fear that the seaplane might already be under the surface of the Pacific.

Until noon today (Island time)

completion of the scheduled flight from San Francisco to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, seemed probable. The PN-9 No. 1 was operating without mechanical difficulties which had forced down her sister seaplane, No. 3, some 300 miles from the Golden Gate.

High winds, encountered more than 1400 miles out, caused the first real difficulty. Despite the lightened weight of the plane's cargo through consumption of fuel the big ship was unable to make over 75 nautical an hour. This resulted not only in actual delay, but in consumption of more gasoline than had been intended for that stage of the journey. Shortly after noon Commander Rodgers sent his first message informing navy radio stations that his ship was running short of gasoline.

Fear that he might not be able to complete his scheduled flight broadened into certainty as the minutes passed and navy officials received Commander Rodgers' latest observations. Then silence. The seaplane answered no more calls. She was lost in the rain, with a restless sea threatening underneath.

The crew of the PN-9 No. 1 comprises: Commander John Rodgers, Washington flight commander.

Lieutenant Byron J. Connell, assistant pilot, Pittsburgh, Penn. Skiles N. Pope, aviator pilot, Jackson, Tenn.

William H. Bowlin, aviation chief machinist mate, Richmond, Virginia.

Otis G. Stantz, chief radio man, Terre Haute, Ind.

Navy officials here tonight expressed confidence in Rodgers' ability. "If anybody can do it John Rodgers can," was one comment. "He'll come swinging into here with that old smile of his and ask what the shooting's all about," said another.

Rodgers formerly was commander of the Pearl Harbor air station and has many friends in the islands.

The PN-9 No. 1 was reported to have a stalling or landing speed of approximately 60 miles an hour, which air officers pointed out would be an additional danger point in a heavy sea. The weather constituted the chief basis for tonight's anxiety.

Available flying forces of the islands are expected to start a systematic search for the seaplane at dawn tomorrow, using the island of Maui as a base. Six planes went forward to Maui today to act as an escort for the big seaplane. They were ordered to start the search late today, but after a preliminary trip over the ocean reported that insufficient daylight left only poor visibility.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—(By Associated Press.)—The navy seaplane PB-1, which was unable to accompany the two planes on the proposed flight to Honolulu yesterday on account of motor replacements, will take off on an attempted non-stop flight to the Hawaiian Islands at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Captain Stanger, flight project commander, announced that the PB-1, the largest of the three planes which were to make the flight, would take the air alone after several test flights during the day had been successfully completed.

The giant ship developed motor trouble on its flight from Seattle more than a week ago and replacement of motors and repairs made it necessary to postpone its
