Word From Bina West

The local lodge of the Woman's Benefit association, Queen Review No. 5, has received the announcement that their supreme commander, Miss Bina M. West, has been elected the first woman president of the National Fraternal Congress of America. This congress represents 88 of the leading fraternal societies of the continent in which the Woman's Benefit association stands fourth. Miss West was the founder of this society in 1892 and now it has the record of being the largest of its kind in the world.

In commenting on her election, Miss West said: "I am old fashioned enough to believe that there is a place in the world for the

fraternal benefit system of insurance. They have already paid out in benefits many billions of dollars, and if there had been more fraternity in the old world there never could have been a world war."

The local review of 125 members is sending most hearty and loyal support to its commander who is making a woman's pioneer presidency in the National Fraternal Congress.
