Ninetieth Birthday

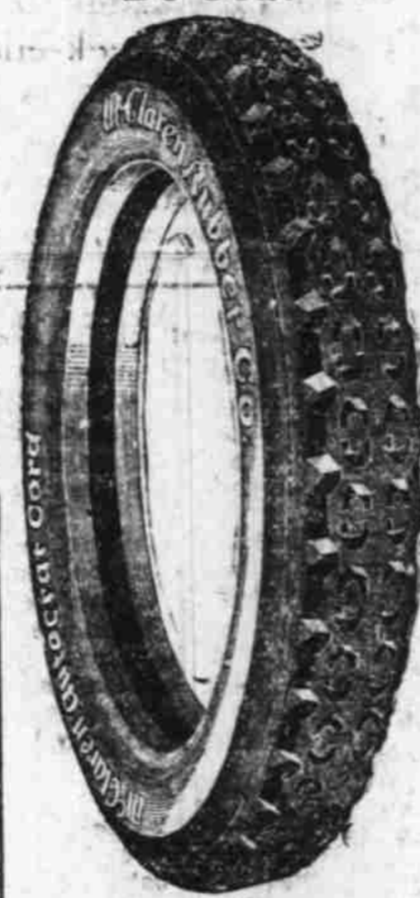

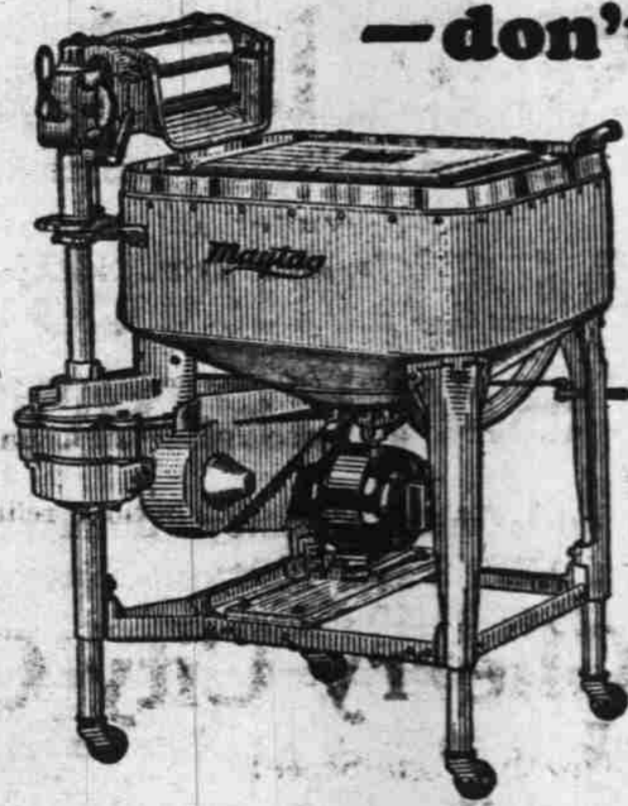
