Dr. Emmons Successful in Can You Figure Out That Caesarean Operation With Local Anesthetic

That Salem physicians are keeping abreast of recent advances in medical science was indicated here recently when Dr. Carl W. Emmons, local specialist in obstetrics, successfully performed at the Salem hospital what is known in the profession as a classical Caesarean section under local anesthetic Performance of the delicate operation under local anesthetic by a

method only recently developed in the east, was the first time that it has ever been performed here and one of the first times that it has been performed in the state. Three nurses from the Marion County Child Health Demonstration watched the operation.

Dr. Emmons is one of the many medical specialists to locate here recently. Ability to perform the operation under the newly devised method of local anesthetic will mean the future saving of many lives and babies during maternity, according to doctors who watched the operation.

Modern medical practice has made it possible that today a mother and her baby have a 50 per cent better chance of life when under the care of trained doctors than ten years ago, according to Dr. Emmons. Application of the principles of surgical anticeptis to. obstetrician operations and improved methods of parental care of the mother over a period of months before the birth to prevent complications are making vast strides in protecting the lives of mothers, he declares.
