IS EVOLUTION A MERE THEORY?

THE following is quoted from a letter recently received from a sub- Republicans Pessimistic scriber of the Mercury Herald: "In all of your editorials on evolution it is apparent that you present evolution as if it were a science whereas, in fact, it is at best only a theory or hypothesis. In my opinion the whole trouble in Tennessee and elsewhere where this matter is being fought is this: Evolution is being taught as a science in our schools when it is only a mere hypothesis. Let our professors and teachers be honest and teach it for what it is, a theory only, and meet of this trouble would vanish."

Our subscriber, like many others, does not discriminate between evolution itself and the cause or causes that have brought it about and the influence or influences that control it.

Evolution means the gradual and orderly development of the uni-

verse, the earth and the life upon it. Through constant refinement and progress. Not only have the planets been thus evolved, but the earth, which is one of these planets, and all the life upon it. Through the countless ages of this development, many forms of life have appeared upon the earth and many have disappeared or become extinct. This development is still in progress and will doubtless go on through eternity. The evidences of this development are so numerous, so

overwhelming, as to compel acceptance of the truth of evolution.

In this connection let us quote Vernon Kellogg, professor of entomology of Leland Stanford university. He says: "The evolution conception itself is no lonfer a debated question; where as the partitude to be assumed by Republicular methods and, above all, the so-called factors, or initiating and cans toward the Free State and Northern governments to which guiding causes of evolution, are still open to debate, and, indeed, are continuously and vigorously debated. When one reads of disagreements among biologists concerning the merits of Darwinism, it is not a disagreement concerning the fact of evolution, for which the term 'Darwinism' is too often synonymously used in popular writing and speaking, but it is a disagreement concerning the value of Charles Darwin's explanation of the cause of evolution, namely, his theories of natural and sexual selection." "Today there is not a biologist of standing who does not accept the theory, or better, fact, of evolution. And the great majority of all people who think about the matter at put on a "foreign reserve list" for all accept also this once ultra-heretical and scoffed-at doctrine."

In the fossiliferous and other remains of the past forms of life found upon the earth the scientists of today find irrefutable proof of the fact of evolution, and a study of these remains has enabled them to obtain a fairly complete history of the life upon the earth and of the earth itself. With these thoroughly established facts before him no scientist or teacher of science could be honest with himself and deny or ignore them. Any scientist who does not loyally follow the truth that his investigations reveal to him, no matter where it leads,

not worthy to be classed as a scientist.

It is quite true that Darwin's ideas of the origin of species as outlined in his work of that name is a theory, and so far from his idea of natural selection being supported by undisputed facts, the leading scientists of this day are quite generally inclined to reject Darwin's ideas that environment and things outside the forms of life are the sole cause of their modification and ultimately of the origin of new

Many now regard the causes of evolution as a progressive or per

Many now regard the causes of evolution as a progressive or perfecting tendency from within instead of environment or any outside influence; this perfecting tendency being, of course, an endowment bestowed by the Creator. To quote Professor Kellogg again:

"The most modern theory in explanation of evolution is essentially both anti-Lamarckian and anti-Darwinian, but allies itself with that type of explanation which may be called orthogenetic and vitaliatic." But, as heretofore explained, all this discussion about the causes and manner of evolution has little or nothing to do with the fact of evolution itself.

The Fundamentalist brethren are bent on destroying evolution, as conceive that otherwise it will destroy the church—even Chris . But is there any ground for this fear? If the whole Book esis, in which is the biblical story of creation, were blotted out id in no way affect the New Testament, the message and mission sus or Christianity. Besides the story in Genesis is not a story in detail of the creation of the universe. It is at best only a reference to the creation in the most general terms. The story begins with these words: "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." evolutionists does not deny this. But Genesis does not tell us how He created them. To determine by investigation how the Creator brought into being the universe, the world and the life now upon it, is no denial of the creative power of God, or of the statements in

If it be shown that the world has been millions of years in the making instead of six of our days of twenty-four hours each, this may till be reconciled with Genesis. Three days of the creation had pass efore the sun had been created, according to the literal story; these days' could not, therefore, be our days of twenty-four hours each leasured by one revolution of the earth on its axis. We are fold by

reconstructed by one revolution of the earth on its axis. We are told by Peter "that one day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day." These "days" may therefore, have been ages in duration, as Agassiz and others long ago pointed out.

But why continue the effort at reconciling this above in the Book of Genesis with the demonstrated facts of science? Any religion that is dependent upon mere verbiage—even the verbiage of Genesis—is not deep or enduring enough to amount to much to its possessor. The Christianity that is to regenerate the world will bring its devotees to close to God and will fill them so full of the spirit of Christ that they will not be shaken or disturbed though half of the Old Tettament be biotted out or be shown to be allegorical, or mere folk lore. ment be blotted out or be shown to be allegorical, or mere folk lore. Let us seek this kind of religion and when we get it the theological contests over creeds, dogmas and biblical interpretations will not appeal to us as so vitally important.
