SEATTLE, Sept. 17.—(By Associated Press.)—That the guns used in the escape here Tuesday of the six prisoners from the King county jail may have been handed to Alvah Kilbourn, one of the fugitives, when he was arraigned in court last Friday was the belief expressed here tonight by Sheriff Matt Starwich. E. C. Daily, at-

orney for Kilbourn, discounted this theory in a telegram here tonight from Walla Walla. "I was in court when Kilbourn was arraigned," the telegram said. "It is a reflection on Starwich's office if prisoners are returned to jail without being inspected for concealed weapons. The public can rest assured that the guns were not taken into jail that way.
