**COLLEGE LECTURE COURSES PLANNED**

Willamette to Start Winter Program at Waller Hall September 24

Willamette University is announcing the first of a series of lectures to be given in Waller Hall during the winter on questions of cultural and scientific value and of popular interest. These lectures are being arranged by the regular faculty committee on outside lectures, of which Professor Earl T. Brown is chairman. They are to be open to the public and are intended to be a part of Willamette's offering to community entertainment and education. It is hoped that such a series will become a permanent annual contribution of the University to community interests.

The first lecture will be given by Edward C. Raine, who will speak the evening of September 24 on the subject, "Alaska." This lecture is illustrated with one hundred fifty slides and is built out of the experiences of twenty-five years' residence in Alaska, during six of which Mr. Raine was a representative of the United States treasury department and visited each year every town and village in the territory. Mr. Raine is vouched for by the Juneau Dispatch, The Juneau Empire, and The Dawson News and by prominent educators throughout the United States and the committee believes that they are fortunate in securing him for the first number of the series.

Other lectures whom the committee hope to bring to Salem during the winter are Sherwood Anderson, short story writer and novelist, author of "Winesburg, Ohio," and of the novel "Dark Laughter," which is to be published in October; Lewis R. Freeman, author of "On The Roof Of The Rockies"; and William Webster Ellsworth, member of the Century company for over thirty years, and now lecturing on "Shakespeare and Old London." Mr. Ellsworth lectured at the University several years ago before very appreciative audiences and is certain to receive a welcome if he chooses to come again.


