Helen and Blanche Hodnett, sister singers of duets, will be a

MALMOE, Sweden.—The old military drill ground at Ljungbyhed has been converted into a playground this summer, where 3000 school children, accompanied by their teachers, have been encamped in the army barracks, while receiving instruction in physical culture and outdoor life. It has been the largest mobilization of school children ever seen in Sweden and has been so successful that it will be repeated next year.

## Brazilian Organization

## Seeks to Increase Voting

RIO DE JANEIRO.—The Commercial Association of Rio de Janeiro, an organization similar to Chambers of Commerce in the United States, is expanding a drive to increase voting in Brazil. An

example of the lack of interest in voting, the association cites, is the federal district in which Rio de Janeiro is situated. It contains about 350,000 men 21 years and older, yet the number properly

registered for voting does not exceed 100,000.

The number of recognized votes cast at the last presidential election in the federal district for both candidates was 13,197.

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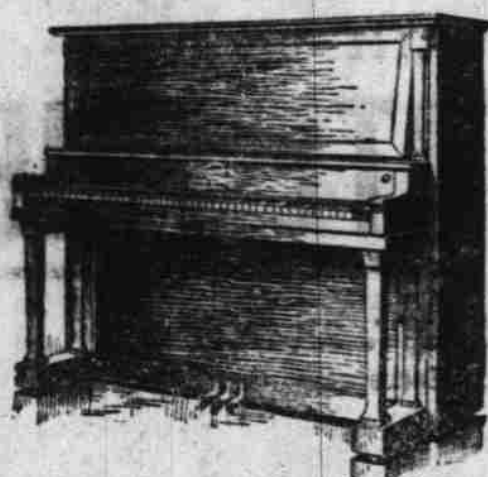


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
