Two More Men Report for Practice; Others Are Expected This Week

Two more men reported for practice at the Bearcat camp Saturday. Winslow, who acted as quarter in last year's scrub team was back on the field, and looking in good shape. Big Bill Mudra, lengthy tackle, arrived on the field a half an hour after practice started. He had driven 40 miles in an endeavor to make the field in time for practice, but suffered two punctures on the way. Incidentally he did not have time to get into a suit, and attention to the condition of his car took up his time the rest of the day.

At least it looks as though Willmette has found the one looked for for years. Lack of a quarter has for years been a set back in the team. But Riddel, from Concord, Cal., seems at this stage of the game to look like a real quarter. He is tall and weighs 180 good solid pounds, and, best of all, has the faculty, it appears, of using his head. He shows promise of developing into a good kicker, and on the field has revealed a remarkable talent for handling the forward pass.

Fasnacht, veteran end on the Willmette team, suffered Saturday from the renewal of an old injury. That leaves by one left-ender on the line, as Stoizheise, who played tackle last year, has been changed to half. Monday, however, Houston at center, Hartley at tackle and Robertson at end are expected to report. All are members of last year's squad.

For the first time of the season, the squad was divided into teams, and the men engaged in scrimmage. Fasnacht shows promise at drop kicking, and Baker, a freshman candidate, is showing strength in that field.

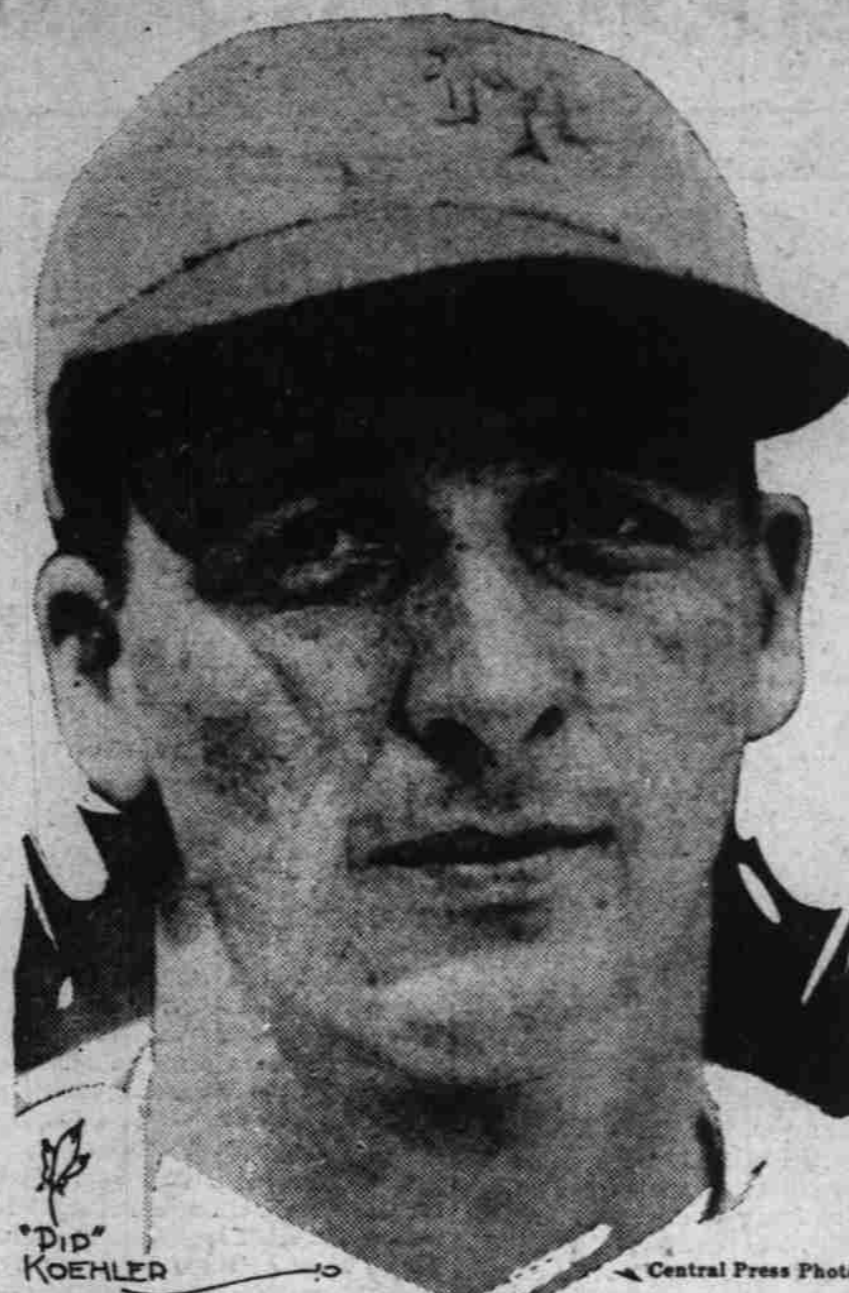
Twenty more men are expected to report for practice when school opens Monday. At the present time there are only enough men out to make up two teams, the smallest opening turnout Williamette has had in years.

Today he was far from having Tilden that close to defeat but he was times within a point of taking the second set and maintaining an advantage with which the impetus of his attack might have beaten down even Tilden's brilliant resources.

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BUDGET REPORT IS OUT

ADMINISTRATION ECONOMY RECORD IS PRAISED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Displaying what Director Lord described as "a record of accomplishment" in carrying forward the administration policy of economy, the bureau of the budget today submitted its annual report to the president covering operations for the fiscal year ended last June 30.

The report carried the statement that the detailed survey given was published primarily for the purpose of inspiring "the rank and file of government personnel to economize and to initiate and carry into effect more efficient methods of transacting the government's business."

President Coolidge's announcement, made at the meeting of government officials in June that government expenses for the year beginning next July 1 should not exceed \$3,080,000,000, was recalled, but Director Lord failed to give any indication as to whether the budget paring of estimates would rest in a lower figure.

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Births in Japan Average Nearly Four a Minute

OSAKA.—Illustrations at the recent national statistics exhibition showed that the population of Japan is increasing at the rate of approximately three person every two minutes. Calculating apparatus as also latest invention was exhibited as also were charts and drawings illustrating all kinds of statistics.

In the population section it was shown that births in Japan are at

the rate of 3.88 a minute while deaths occur at the rate of 2.4 a minute, leaving a net gain of 1.48 a minute. The Japanese birth and death rate, figured in that way, were shown to be the highest among the nations of the world. As to births, Germany came after Japan with slightly less than three a minute; Britain was next with a little more than two and France showed a rate of one and one-half a minute.

Other statistics which attracted attention showed that in 1913

Osaka consumed luxuries valued at 1,200,000 yen, while the value of luxuries consumed in 1923 had increased to 7,200,000 yen.
