U. S. AIRMEN WITH FRENCH ARE WARNED

(Continued from page 1) been indicated at the department whether any further steps were contemplated.

The first section cited imposes a fine upon American citizens who enlist in foreign military forces while the second authorizes American diplomatic agents in territories covered by treaties, which grant extra territorial rights to the United States to issue writs and take other measures of a legal character to prevent service by Americans in foreign military units.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Marshal Pétain's offensive against rebels in Morocco, which began September 10, besides shattering the defense of most important tribes and recovering nearly 1,500 square miles of territory north of the Ouergha river, has brought the French troops several points nearer to the Franco-Spanish frontier, as determined by Algerias pact.

The operations, culminated today with the capture of Zaouia Guad Ghezzer, eight miles northeast of the Bihane ridge, bringing the French line eastward of Tarrant up to the level of the westward line established a week ago by the capture of Amiot.

General Naulin received a pressing invitation from the Beni Brahim tribesmen to come and occupy their capital, Oudj Ghezzer, and receive their submission.

Liberia opposes the arms ban, not that it makes any particular difference.

CHURCHES MUST AID FIGHT AGAINST RUM

(Continued from page 1) challenging task of developing public support for the 18th amendment. The hour has struck for following up these steps by means of a constructive program for temperance education in all churches.

"With the coming of national prohibition there has been a tendency to rely on legislation alone and to relax educational efforts as to the evils of alcohol and the moral meaning of temperance. A survey of the methods of religious education now in use in churches shows that training and habits of temperate living have made little or no progress in recent years. Such a situation if long continued would be fatal. This was one of the reasons why the research department undertook a survey of the present status of prohibition. It is believed that one of the results will be a movement to re-instate a program of thorough temperance education in the Sunday schools, adult classes, and other organizations of the churches.

"The research department of the federal council of churches is under the direction of the Rev. F. Ernest Johnson, a Methodist preacher with special training in research work. The Rev. Dr. William Adams Brown of New York is chairman of the committee. The money necessary for the study was given by some of the best friends of prohibition in the United States.

Presidential Palace at Times Was Like Prison

BERLIN.—The late Friedrich Ebert did not always feel exalted in his position as president of the German Republic. An incident illustrating how the president felt at times is related in the diaries and memoirs of the late Minna Cauer, woman leader.

"While visiting the President, Mr. Ebert complained that he never was able, in his position, to follow his own inclination, that he never could get away from himself.

"Circumspection, calmness and moderation in all things are the obligations my position entails," he said.

"How do you feel, Mr. President, when you look back into the past from your splendid executive mansion and this beautiful park? Minna Cauer asked.

"As in a prison," the first German president replied, in a voice charged with emotion.

Mummification of Homan Body Baffles Authorities

NAPLES.—A striking example of the mummification of a human body by natural processes has been discovered at Vatolla, in the province of Salerno, with the exhumation of the body of a local resident, Rosa Scarpa, who died in 1912. The body was found to be in a perfect state of preservation; even her clothes were in a sort of petrified condition, but retained their original colors.

Thinking the mummification process might have been due to

peculiar chemical qualities of the soil, the authorities ordered the opening of an adjacent grave, but the corpse in the latter grave had completely decomposed. This, therefore, led to the belief among devout natives that a miracle had been wrought.
