SCHOOL SOCIETIES SAID OUT FOREVER

Students Will Heed Public
Sentiment Declares Nelson;
to Sign Pledges

"The students of the high school have sense enough to heed public sentiment," declared J. C. Nelson, principal of the Salem high school in his address before the Rotarians at their noonday luncheon Wednesday. He declared that public sentiment demanded the action taken by the school board to do away with secret and semi-secret societies in the high school. Asserting that students have obtained the impressions that belonging to the societies has made them "a little better," he said:

"When we begin to judge a man by what he belongs to instead of what he is, we have set up a false and an undemocratic standard."

The societies in the high school are out to stay, he said, and as proof Mr. Nelson informed the Rotarians that the four girls' societies and two of the three men's societies have already disbanded voluntarily, although no official action has yet been taken on the matter.

Mr. Nelson said that students of the school meant all right in the organizing of the various societies, and that they were merely imitating their parents, who belong to various service clubs or dancing clubs or societies of one sort or another, but that they were unable to manage the organizations in the same way.

"Fundamentally, the children are better than we are," he declared, "but they lack experience."

The influence of the societies

have been strongly felt in school politics, he said, and men were backed for office because of the societies they belonged to rather than because they were the best men for the positions.

The United States is suffering from a lack of hereditary nobility, Mr. Nelson declared, and as a result attempts have been made to substitute some other form of nobility which "looks like a stampede" to get into something is innate.

Although he expressed himself as firmly approving the action taken by the school board in regard to the secret societies, he declared that he is glad to see the students develop something new, even though trouble is caused by it, because it reveals originality among the students.

Mr. Nelson expressed the hope that the students would not try to evade the resolution concerning secret societies by attempting to organize societies outside of the school. He declared that any society that is organized outside of the school by school students would have its effect upon the school, and hence, would really be an inside organization. If the influence were not felt in the school, if the students did not know who were in the societies, there would be no incentive to join, he asserted, as hope of appearing important to the students at school is the underlying factor that makes for membership.

The students will be required to sign a pledge next Friday stating that they do not, and will not be affiliated with any secret or semi-secret society at the high school. Mr. Nelson intimated that any student who refuses to sign will be required to sever his connection with the high school.

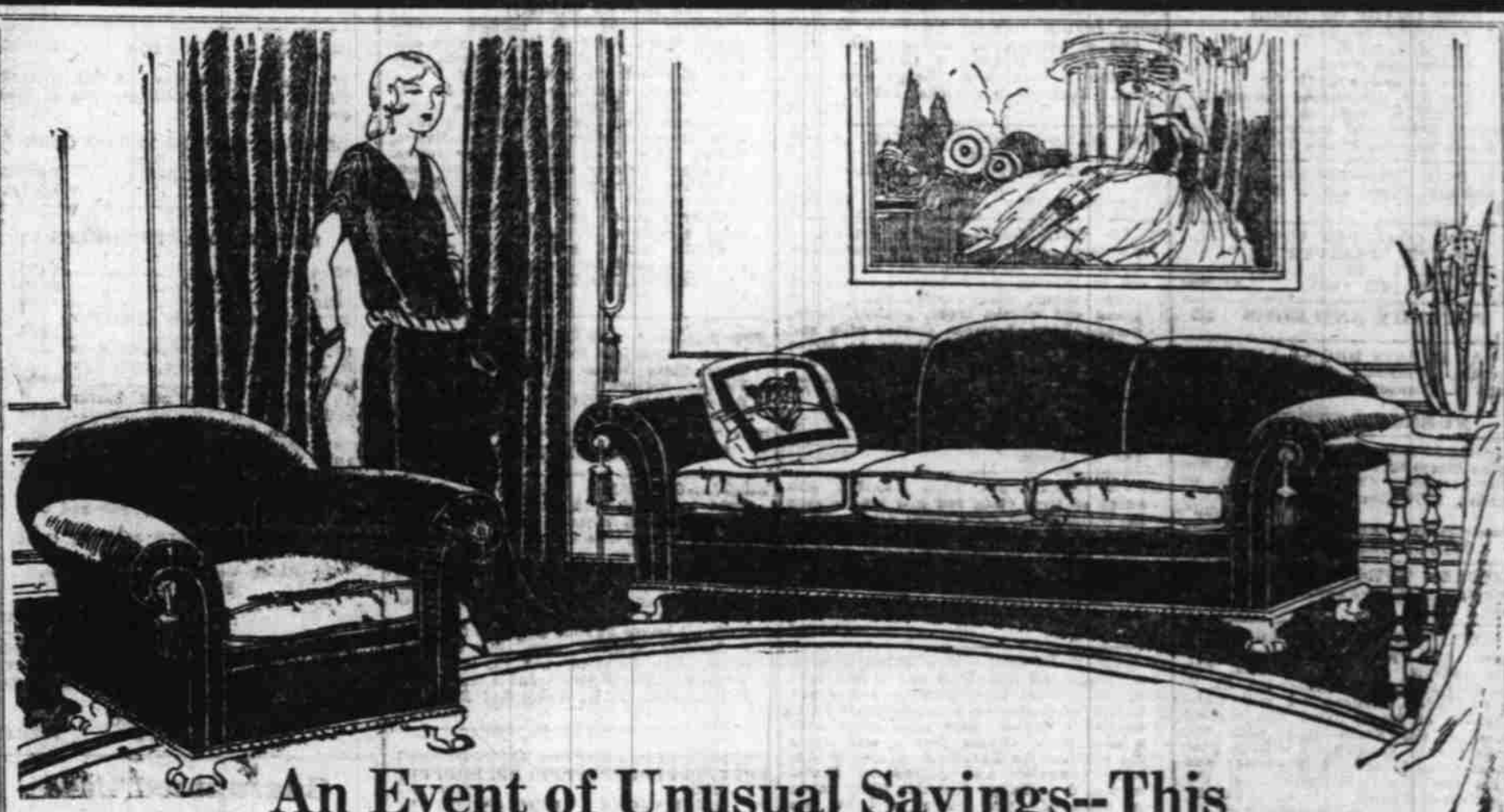
