Art Course to Open

Beginning Thursday evening, October 1, University of Oregon extension classes in art will be held in the lecture at the Public Library from 7 to 9 o'clock, each week under the leadership of Professor N. B. Zane.

The first hour will be devoted to theory and practice design, and the second hour to theory and color. Under the topic of design the class will deal with problems, methods, and criticisms. In this work the actual solving of problems will be considered with simple beginnings that will work up to a stage representing average skill in idea and execution. Those registering will further take up the demonstration of problems and criticisms. The things to be used in solving such problems will be the pen, the pencil, and the brush, with considerable home work.

The purpose of the course is to develop the student's creative power along five definite lines:

1. Clear comprehension.
2. Coordination of eye and hand.
3. Self-confidence.
4. Technical excellence in line, form, and tone.
5. Originality.

A study of modern color theory—the nature and proper ties of color—its relationship, harmonies—pigments and paints, will all be considered. Emphasis will be placed on the development of the individual color sense, and the formation of good taste in color.

The work will include practical problems which will be worked out at home and kept as a permanent note-book. The work is being sponsored by the Salem Arts' League and students may register

with Miss Vivian Hargrove, registration chairman, or Dr. H. Rowland, the League president. University credit is given for a term's work.
