Car of Onions Shipped—
The season's first carload of onions was shipped Monday from the Labish district. Before the season is over, it is expected that 600 carloads of onions will have been shipped. Prices now are from \$1.10 to \$1.25 a sack, and at this rate, the crop will represent a gross of about \$600,000. Celery amounting to 60 carloads had been shipped up to the end of last week, and according to word received here, orders on hand will call for a daily shipment of two carloads for some time to come. Rain stains have deprived the onions of the even color they had last year, but it is reported that the quality has been retained.

Brotherhood Committee Meets—
The World Brotherhood committee of Oregon and Idaho met Monday at the local YMCA building. Those present at the meeting were W. P. Walters of Eugene, former Marion county secretary; W. H. Richter, community secretary for the Portland community east side YMCA; Jim Paley of the Portland YMCA, Ben Kimber, Marion county secretary, and Mr. Crary, local boys' secretary. The organization is for the purpose of extending to the boys of foreign countries the opportunities to be had by American boys. They recommended the organization of a federation of all YMCA clubs into the World Brotherhood. Ben Kimber stated that the organization was more than likely to go through.
