

FAST TIME MADE ON HEAVY COURSE

Harness Races Cancelled; Governor Pierce Derby Is Scheduled Today

Despite a heavy, muddy track and a cold rain, the running races at the state fair yesterday were among the best ever seen here. Only a handful of people attended the races, but those that were there witnessed three excellent runs, together with several highly interesting events put on by the Welsh stables of Calgary, Canada. No harness events were run. In the six furlong race, Poor Puss, a beautiful black mare, took first place in a stirring finish, with Jockey Buell up. The six furlongs was run in 1:15 1/2, remarkable time considering the condition of the track. Five horses started at the barrier and made a wonderful race the entire distance. Black Shasta, with Donovan up, came in second, with Rochester Jr., a fine black horse, taking third position. Two other horses, Conchiner and Abe Riley were left far behind the field. The purse was for \$500.

In the "Lucky Devil" eligibility stake, featuring all ages, with 12 pounds below the weight-for-age scale, Peace Flag, carrying 125 pounds, with Jockey Rowe up, took first in the 5 1/2 furlongs, setting a time of 1:11 1/4. Only three horses were entered in the event, and such made it a race. Peace Flag came under the wire only a few feet ahead of the field, with Billy Randolph and Solon Ches racing neck and neck at the finish. Billy Randolph took second place, with Jones up. Solon Ches was ridden by Miss Barnett, daughter of the owner of the horse. Miss Barnett made a brilliant ride for the entire distance. Day Man, a brown gelding, with Donovan up, placed first in the "Ancient Highway" run for three-year-olds and upward for the 4 1/4 furlongs. A purse of \$150 was offered. Sky Lark ridden by Buell, placed second, with Slats, Mopsy up, and Babe Ruth up, taking third and fourth. The time for the distance was 57 1/2. The field got off to a fine start and came under the wire in a whipping finish.

In all of the three events the horses got off at the first scratch and no delay was caused by repeated recalls to the barrier. The riding was excellent. Jockeys dismounted regarding the slippery condition of the track and showing their horses to the fullest extent throughout the distance.

A daring Roman riding exhibition was put on between the races by the Welsh stables of Calgary, Canada. Three boys, Joseph Welsh, Lewis Welsh and Carl Alton, competed in the one-half mile run, with Lewis Welsh taking first. The time was made in 57 1/4. At the conclusion of the racing program the game stables put on

a jumping contest featuring some of the best jumping and hunting stock ever seen at the fair.

The harness events that were scheduled for yesterday will be run off on the next favorably day, the speed department announced. The races on yesterday's card were a 2:15 trot with a \$1000 purse and a 2:35 pace with a purse of \$500. Each race was of three heats, every heat a race.

Today, weather permitting, a 2:08 pace is scheduled, with a purse of \$2000 offered. Such old favorite as Hal Paxton Jr., Stony Logan, Borden McKinney, Mary J., Hal Fitzsimmons, and Al Silk are expected to compete. A 2:25 trot is also to be run, and will bring out, among other horses, The Cavalier, by Cavalier Gate, Bill Schultz and Dick Doney. Probably the most important event will be the Governor Pierce Derby, with a purse of \$1000 and a silver cup to go to the winner. Horses expected to enter this race are Rochester Jr., a brown horse, Cleo's Rochester, Peace Flag, who won yesterday's race, and Black Shasta.

Besides this, two other running events are scheduled.

The lettermen are A. Lyons and Temple, ends; J. Drager, tackle; B. Drager, quarter; Kelly, half and captain, and Noeske, half.

Clark Jackson, who it was believed would be out of school this year, has signified his intentions of returning to school as soon as the fair week is over, and will be out in suit Monday to try for his old berth at guard. It is thought that the return of Clark will add considerable to the strength of the team.

Even so, Coach Huntington is by no means shy on guard material. In fact, he has so many good contenders for the post that he is not yet sure just which ones will be placed there. H. Lyons has been showing class at guard as well as at center. Lang, a three-year letterman from Dunsmuir, Wash., high school, is fast and weighs 170 pounds. He is entering a bid for the position of guard. Davis

is also showing up well at guard. And with all this good material, Coach Huntington has on his squad one Murphy, a three-year letterman at Stayton who tips the scales at 210.

Coach Huntington declares that all 30 men look good to him, and he sees no reason why Salem high school should not be awarded the top rung in the Willamette valley football ladder.

This Saturday, for the first time in several years, the alumni will get together a team to give the first team a hard workout. There will be a regular game. Frank Patterson, a Salem high letterman, is going to Corvallis to score up some Salem alumni for the occasion, and it is expected that the high school team will have its hands full if it wants to get the bigger part of the score in the alumni game.

The first regular game of the season is to be played in Salem October 9, when the Salem high boys will meet the fast team from West Linn union high school. A lot depends on this game, as it will reveal the possibilities of the Salem team for the valley championship.

DEMPSEY, WILLS AGREE TO MATCH

Heavyweight Championship Stake for Bout to Be Held in September

NILES, Mich., Sept. 29.—(By Associated Press.)—Harry Wills, a one-time stevedore, tonight ended his four year quest for a heavyweight championship fight when he signed to meet Jack Dempsey in a 10 round no decision contest, to be staged at Michigan City, Ind., in September, 1926.

The match between Dempsey and the negro challenger, agreed upon after a 24-hour conference in South Bend, ending at five o'clock tonight, was definitely closed in this city, selected because boxing is legalized in this state.

Dempsey, Promoter Floyd Fitzsimmons, Wills, his manager, Paddy Mullins, and others motored from South Bend in three automobiles, starting just at dusk. Promoter Fitzsimmons announced that neither Wills nor Dempsey had been guaranteed a cent and that both will box on percentage, the respective shares of which he declined to reveal. He announced that he had posted \$200,000 as a forfeit; that Dempsey had posted \$100,000 and that Manager Mullins had put up \$50,000 for Wills. Both Wills and Dempsey will receive \$25,000 as preliminary expenses. This money was paid them tonight.

The forfeits have been posted in the First National bank in South Bend.

had prepared, the board adjourned until tomorrow, when the witness will conclude his testimony with an oral "destructive" argument which he was unable to give because of fatigue and a shortage of time.

Doubting whether the board would hear certain portions of his arguments, Colonel Mitchell today assured that he could "put everything in the record" that he desired.

Briefly, the officer who recently was relieved of active duty at his San Antonio post, advocated creation of a department of national defense in which equals status would be given sub-division of land, sea and air. He predicted this recommendation upon what he said was the necessity for greater attention to aviation in the scheme of national defense and upon the need for improving the air services, the condition of which he described as "inadequate and deplorable."




