SIDELIGHTS OF THE FAIR

Though he has displayed poultry at the state fair for 29 years, Fred A. Johnson of Tacoma is paying his first visit to the fairgrounds this year. His activities as superintendent of the western Washington fair at Puyallup have kept him from attending the Oregon fair. Mr. Johnson captured a first and second prize on a Barred Plymouth pullet, the same for a White Leghorn cock and hen and second, fourth and fifth on cockerels of the same breed.

Perhaps there are few people in Salem who have seen more state fairs than Johnny Jones, caterer for the Elks club for years, who is this year enjoying his 52nd fair, operating an eating concession for the past 16 years and having employment in some official capacity or other for the remainder. The year 1873 saw his first appearance and had it not been for the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland in 1905, he would have added another fair to his list.

Some excellent pieces of handwork are on display in the textile department this year. Chief of these, and the one that is commanding the greatest interest is a crocheted rug, 9 by 13 feet, entered by Mrs. Alfred Mann of Portland. An offer of \$1200 has been refused for the rug. Mrs. H. J. Yenne of Salem has entered a spinning wheel brought from Germany more than 50 years ago. Two old spreads are on display, one a hand-woven wool spread more than 100 years old, entered by Mrs. Ella Plank of Woodburn, and the other entered by Mrs. J. C. Jenks of Salem. The latter spread was made by her mother, Nancy Ann Young, and has the figures 1842 woven in one corner. Mrs. Halvorsen of Salem has entered two woven wool sheets. There is a large department devoted to children's work and all displays are on a larger scale than ever before.

A handsome silver trophy cup has been donated by Hartman Bros., jewelers, to be awarded to the best car over all at the motor style show parade and review to be held Saturday afternoon before the grandstand. Any car whether large or small is eligible for competition for this award. The decision will be made by the judges after the last car has passed in review. Moving picture men will be on hand to take pictures of the grand prize car and of the cars winning ribbons. These pictures will be shown in local theaters. The cup is on display in Bishop's clothing store window, and is attracting a great deal of attention.

LARGE STADIUM PACKED FOR NIGHT HORSE SHOW

by the Welch Brothers of Calgary. rated the red streamers while third and fourth places went to Fox and Brown, two animals entered by Guy Ray of Rickreall.

The heavy hunter jumping class provided some of the most breath-taking thrills of the evening. The event called for performance over five jumps and one gate—two hurdles with timber, a four-foot post and rail; and one side of three-foot pig pen. Clear-cut jumps alternated with those that were ragged, quite at random. McCleave took three out of four ribbons in the final score, rating first with Wee McGregor, third with Moderation, and fourth with Victoria. The second place was won by Mrs. Stanley C. E. Smith's entry, Jim Noble, an animal of excellent form.

In the ladies' single, light harness event, horses from the West stables captured all the prizes. Harmony Mathias, following the standard set on Tuesday night, took another first; Molina a repeated second, and Marie Seaton, third.

In the combination three-gaited horse, featuring the walk, trot and canter, only three entries were listed. Armament, Mrs. Stanley Smith's entry, was first; W. F. Turner's Sheik, second, and Lady Mary of the McCleave string, third.

The polo pony event proved one of the most picturesque of the evening. Madeline McCleave on Aviator was applauded roundly for the speed and skill with which she put her mount through the paces, receiving the blue ribbon. McCleave horses took second and third places as well—Moderation and General Byng being the ani-

mals to qualify. Natt McDougall's Gypsy Queen rated fourth.

In the roadsters class of pairs, only two entries were made, Golden West and Lottie Lou being successful over Shikara and mate.

A record number of entries were made in the closing event of the evening—the spectacular Conitilian—when 27 jumpers were brought in through the gates. All awards but one, the fourth, were made to McCleave horses who throughout the show have demonstrated some exceptional training. Colony placed first; Lady Mary, second; Aristocrate, third. The fourth award went to Lil Webb, Miss Dorothy McBride's entry.

A summary of awards shows a total of ten ribbons going to McCleave horses during one evening. George A. L. Lauer is acting as ringmaster throughout the season.
