The first meeting of the Parent-Teacher association for the current school year was held Monday evening, Sept. 28th, in the high school. About 60 were in attendance.

Mrs. Raymond Criswell, the president, was in the chair; Secretary Mrs. Jessie Moyer, and Treasurer Mrs. Carrie E. Jobs, both present.

Routine business was transacted, including report of committee serving during the summer. The reports showed tables built in the new park on the Little Luckiamute, work with the civic pride committee of the commercial club, and a general help in all matters of community interest during the summer.

The question of hot soup lunches at the grade school, as was served last year, was discussed, and the president asked for volunteers upon this committee. The following were appointed: Mrs. R.
