HUNTING DEATHS MOUNT

PENALTIES FOR CARELESSNESS NOTED IN WARNING

E. F. Averil, state game warden, has issued a letter to all deputy game wardens telling them that reports reaching the main office indicate that an unusually large number of hunting accidents have happened for the first half of the deer season. He asked that attention be called to the fact that any person who is responsible for an accident is thereafter prohibited "from bearing firearms within the state of Oregon."

In his letter Warden Averil declares it is his opinion that "Criminal carelessness is the mildest term that can be applied to an accident of this kind." We owe it to the careful hunters to throw every safeguard around them we possibly can to protect them from the danger of injury at the hands of irresponsible men with guns. In the case of a man who mistakes another for a deer and shoots him we hope that public sentiment in this section is sufficient to cause his arrest and prosecution on the charge of manslaughter.

RESIGNATION IS HINTED

ILL HEALTH MAY FORCE SECRETARIAL WEEKS TO RETIRE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(By Associated Press.)—Secretary Weeks' return to Washington today from the long absence necessitated by ill health served to strengthen the impression that he will retire from the cabinet in the near future, although no information as to his plans was available either from Mr. Weeks himself, or in any other quarters.

The war secretary was a luncheon guest at the White House. He did not visit his office across the street at the war department, how-

ever, and he put aside inquiries as to whether he expected to resume his duties there. He was compelled to give up active management of departmental affairs early in April when he suffered an attack diagnosed as thrombosis, and has not been at his office since that time.

Mr. Weeks explained the immediate purpose of his trip to Washington as having to do with the necessity of clearing out his home here, which was sold during his absence, but which still contains paintings and other effects which will be shipped to his residence in New Hampshire.

SPANISH TROOPS ARE NOW ABLE TO OBTAIN WATER

MADRID, Oct. 3.—(By Associated Press.)—The fall of Ajdir and the clearing of the Rifflans out of that sector of Morocco has transformed the lot of the Spanish soldier from one of hardship to actual comfort, with the luxury of water to drink and water to bathe in.

A brief announcement from the Spanish general headquarters this afternoon reads: "The Spanish troops have reached the Nekour river in their further advance in the Alhucemas region. Absolute tranquility prevails within our protectorate."

Canada Nets Big Return From American Tourists

OTTAWA, Ont.—Tourists from the United States brought \$150,000,000 in revenue to Canada in 1925, according to estimates of government officials. This sum is equal to a quarter of the value of the Dominion's wheat crop and approximates the values of the annual mining output of Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia combined.

More than 2,000,000 American automobiles, it is estimated, have crossed into Canada already this year. They carried approximately 3,000,000 tourists, or one tourist for every man, woman and child in the Dominion. Every province shared in the tourist business. Ontario received the larger traffic. Last year 1,376,988 cars from the

United States entered Ontario, 163,878 of which stayed from two to thirty days, 1,645 from one to six months and the remainder shorter periods.

Report Is Filed—

During the past week 72 men and 8 women were given employment through the employment office at the local YMCA. There were 118 men and 15 women registered at the office. There were 53 requests for male help, and 32 requests for women help. Common labor represented the largest number of jobs given to men.
