

SALEM HIGH TEAM HIT BY INJURIES

Three Backfield Men and Two Tackles Are Out of West Linn Game

Coach Hollis Huntington, Salem high school mentor, is confronted suddenly with a serious problem in today's game against the West Linn Union high school. Just when it appeared that Salem would be able to start out the season with a bang, three backfield men of the first string are out of the lineup for today, and both the regular tackles are on the injured list.

J. Drager, who has been going strong at tackle, and whom Coach Huntington has relied upon to do the punting for this season, is out of it with an infected foot. Blake, the other tackle, sustained pulled muscles in the alumni game last Saturday, and will be unable to start, although he will be out in uniform.

The backfield has been hit the hardest. Kelly, halfback and captain of the team, has been sick all week and will not even be in uniform. French, who has been showing up in whirlwind style at half, is on crutches with a sprained ankle. Lang, who was beginning to look like one of the best full backs turned out at the local school, recently had the tip of his finger cut off and is not as yet able to get back into the game.

But in spite of the setbacks that have befallen the team, Coach Huntington is hopeful of turning in a victory against the fast team from West Linn. He will have practically but one line on the field.

The tentative lineup for today's game will be A. Lyons and Temple, ends; Davis and Jackson, tackles; Query and H. Lyons, guards; Ecker, center; B. Drager, quarter; Phillips and Noeske, halves, and backe, full. In lieu of J. Drager's absence, Phillips will do the punting for the local boys. He will also be shifted to safety on defense, and B. Drager will play at half on defense.

The game is called for Sweetland field at 3:30 o'clock.

Keep the Record Straight

Editor Statesman:

I notice through The Statesman of Wednesday the 7th, that some roses were given by Mrs. Alice A. Sargent to be planted on the state house grounds.

If any record is to be kept, it should be correct, least it be true that, as Napoleon—I think it was—said, "History is fiction agreed upon." The original roses were brought across the plains by the Applegates in 1843.

Mrs. Sargent does not live on the old Applegate home place, but at Jacksonville, where her husband, the late Col. Herbert H. Sargent, bought a home. The home of Lindsay Applegate, her father, was at Ashland, a large part of the town being built upon the old place—the S. P. station, bath house, Elks' temple, etc.

The "record referred" to was a little book bearing the title "Recollections of My Boyhood" by Jesse A. Applegate, son of Lindsay Applegate, written primarily for his grandchildren. A copy came into the hands of Emerson Hough. He always referred to it as "the little book," and used it to lend color and inspiration to his story, saying in letters to the family, "it is almost my novel done in hand.... that and the Journal of Jameson Donner," of the ill-fated Donner party.

Emerson Hough was a friend of Mrs. Sargent. His "Covered Wagon" is a novel, not the history of any one covered wagon train.

Appropos of historical planting, I have often wondered why, in the zeal to clean up, the old apple trees on the university campus were not spared—at least one or two of them. They were not dead and produced pretty good apples before civilization introduced the worm, which might have been eliminated. These were missionary trees, and beautiful in blossom time, even if there had been no fruit; a recurring reminder of the resurrection and those who struggled to hold out the hope in a new commonwealth. AGGIES TO MEET GONZAGA ELEVEN

Teams About Even for Today's Game Which Will Start at 2:30 O'Clock

OAC, CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 8.—Gonzaga university's veteran team, playing the shifty Notre Dame style of football, will meet the Oregon Aggies Friday afternoon in the first big game of the season.

Wednesday night Coach Paul Schessler announced three expected changes in the first team. Harold Liebe will play left tackle substituting for Dixon. Instead of Glenn Dimstead, Clair Badley from last year's freshman will start at guard in place of Liebe.

With Badley and Liebe in the line, besides Robbins, end, also from last year's freshman, a line of six veterans in the seven positions now has but four veterans. Paul Snider, fullback and punter, will be replaced by Kenneth Denman, a red-head who has been called a dark horse ever since the squad turned out this fall.

Professor Sam Dolan of OAC will referee at the special request of Gonzaga. Ted Faulk will be umpire and Eldon Jenne, head linesman.

The game starts promptly at 2:30 o'clock, instead of 1:30 as first announced. There will be no seats reserved, and general admis-

sion prices will admit to any seat in the stadium with its 20,000 covered seats.
