Scholarship Loan Tea

With the major activity of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs centering around the scholarship loan, the tea at the club house on Friday of this week for the purpose of increasing funds for the aid of college girls, will doubtless be one of the most widely attended affairs of the week.

Work of the scholarship loan board first started in 1908 and since that time has been distributed among deserving girls in ten different educational centers in Oregon.
